April Report Shows Building Increase

Highland Park's April building valuation of \$90,938 reveals a substantial increase over the \$40,923 total of the previous month and over the \$70,548 figure for the same period last year.

Construction for the first four months, however, is only 82 percent of that for the first third of 1939, the amount being \$237,339 to \$287,312.

Twenty permits were issued last month, according to Building inspector Sidney Morris, with 11 of them for new dwellings totaling \$76,580.
