

### Complete Tuberculin Testing of Students At H. P. High School

Last week the Lake County Tuberculosis association sponsored the program of tuberculin testing of the students of the Highland Park High school, also the members of the faculty and employees of the high school who desired the test.

There were 181 positive reactors among the students. The association wishes to emphasize that a positive reaction does not indicate an active case of tuberculosis. It only shows that there has been a primary infection, that the patient at some time has taken on the tuberculous germ. The association provides X-rays for all positive reactors to determine if there is any activity. Each reactor should receive periodical X-ray examination until the age of 30.

Dr. Petter of the sanatorium cooperates with the association in these surveys by giving and reading the test, and making the diagnosis from the X-ray.

Miss White of the association reports that 239 X-rays, to date, have been provided by the Lake County Tuberculosis association for the positive reactors of the Highland Park High school; 181 for the student body, and 58 for adults connected with the school. The school reports that 35 students who were absent are still to receive tests.

The entire program of a tuberculin testing survey is furnished free to the schools contacting the Lake County Tuberculosis association for this service. First must come the educational program for the P.-T.A., board and faculty and permission from the proper authorities. The usual procedure can be secured from the office of the Lake County Tuberculosis association. The expense is paid by the association with funds derived from the sale of Christmas Seals and contributions received at that time. The association is very pleased that tuberculin testing of schools could be included in their budget for the year of 1940. This was made possible by the generous response to the 1939 Seal sale, the largest amount ever raised in the history of the association. Due to a lack of funds, the program could not be attempted before last year.

This work will continue and also re-examination of schools already tested just as long as the annual Christmas Seal Sales are as successful as the one of this last year.

### Creative Writing Group to Close Spring Term May 16

Seven hundred and fifty women, interested in program ideas for Federated Women's Clubs, will attend. On Friday, May 10, Mrs. Bennett will be introduced at another conference of program chairmen held at the state headquarters.

### High School Golf Team Wins District Championship May 4

Competing against seven other high schools, the Highland Park high school golf team won the district golf championship last Saturday at the Briarcliff Golf course. The local team with a total score of 336 was eleven points under the New Trier boys who placed second. By virtue of placing third in the team score and first and fourth in individual scores, Waukegan won the district plaque for the best combination of team and individual scores with 17 points. Highland Park with first place for team scores and second for low individual scores, got 16 points.

The team winners from each of the thirteen districts in the state and the two players in each district with the lowest individual scores will compete for the state championship at the Peoria Country club on Saturday, May 11.

Highland Park is the high school that will represent this district. Mike Stolarik of Waukegan and Manuel de la Torre of Highland Park are the individuals who will represent this district. The local

### Martin Dies Will Speak Saturday At Evanston H. S.

"In view of the international situation, the Legion is bringing Martin Dies to Evanston at a most appropriate time," Wesley W. Polk chairman of Post 42's committee in charge of "The Un-American Front" address at Evanston High school May 11, said today.

"We sought to bring the Texas Congressman here on previous occasions but were unable to do so because of his activities and a recent illness," Polk continued.

"Now, however Dies is coming at a select time in view of the manner in which agents of Germany made the invasion of Norway possible.

"If there's anyone capable of preventing such a happening in the United States, it is Dies."

That the leader of the House Committee investigating Un-American Activities already has taken steps to prevent a "second Norway" in the United States was established recently when he proposed a six point defense program against alien movement.

Dies recommended:

1. Immediate deportation of Communist, Nazi and Fascist aliens who are spreading class, religious and racial hatred.

2. Stoppage of Communist activities on government projects "which are financed by the hard-earned money of loyal and patriotic Americans.

3. Registration of all "front organizations," showing semi-annual reports of contributions, names of contributors, and what is done with the money.

4. Legislation outlawing such organizations as the Communist party, the German-American Bund and Italian Fascist, "or any other organization that is shown to be under the control of foreign governments."

5. The Government "seriously and aggressively oppose all legislation, movements or efforts that tend to promote racial, religious or class hatred."

6. An earnest effort by all Americans to "establish sympathetic understanding among all classes, among all creeds, all races and groups" whose common desire is to preserve democratic institutions and processes.

### Highwood Social Service Takes Care Of 51 Emergencies

The Highwood Social Service met at the Highwood City hall Monday night. Reports show that 51 cases have been given assistance in some manner. A number of these cases were of no cost to the local organization, for assistance was given by the Highland Park Social Service, American Legion Auxiliary of Highwood, Highland Park Hospital Auxiliary and Veteran's Relief Commission of Lake County. Had it not been for the cooperation and

generous contributions from these organizations, the local treasury would be depleted. As it has been stated before, the funds can be used only for emergency cases, therefore the officers must make certain that calls are an emergency, for funds are getting low.
