

**Michael W. Driscoll
Early Settler Here
Passes Away Tuesday**

Michael William Driscoll, 79, 21 McGovern street, passed away Tuesday afternoon at the Highland Park hospital. He had been in ill health for some time and had made a trip to Hot Springs, Ark., in an attempt to improve his condition. Enroute home from his trip he suffered a stroke, which resulted in his death.

Born in St. Petersburg, Canada, April 14, 1861, Mr. Driscoll came to Highland Park with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Driscoll, who were early pioneer settlers here, when a small child. The greater portion of his life was spent in this community. In June 1900 he was married to Mary Jane Sweeney of this city who preceded her husband in death in August 1932.

For many years he served as an engineer at Ferry Hall in Lake For-

est, and in a similar capacity at Hospital No. 28, Fort Sheridan, during the last war.

He was the last member of the original Driscoll family, his brother, Officer Dennis Driscoll, having passed away in January. Two other brothers, Tim and Jerry, also preceded him in death.

Surviving him is his second wife, Catherine.

Funeral services will be held from the family residence on McGovern street at 9 a.m. Friday followed by services at St. James church. Burial will be in Ascension cemetery.

William M. Welch, 81, president of the William M. Welch school supply company of Chicago, died Sunday at his home at 200 Belle avenue following a brief illness.

Mr. Welch established his business in Iowa and moved to Chicago in 1891 where it grew to be one of the largest makers of diplomas in the world. He took a very active part in civic and church affairs in Chicago.

He is survived by two sons, M. W. and R. E. Welch; two daughters, Mrs. Denise Holmes of Berkeley, Calif., and Mrs. Mabel Gaidzik of this city.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Unity church, Chicago. Burial was in Memorial Park cemetery.

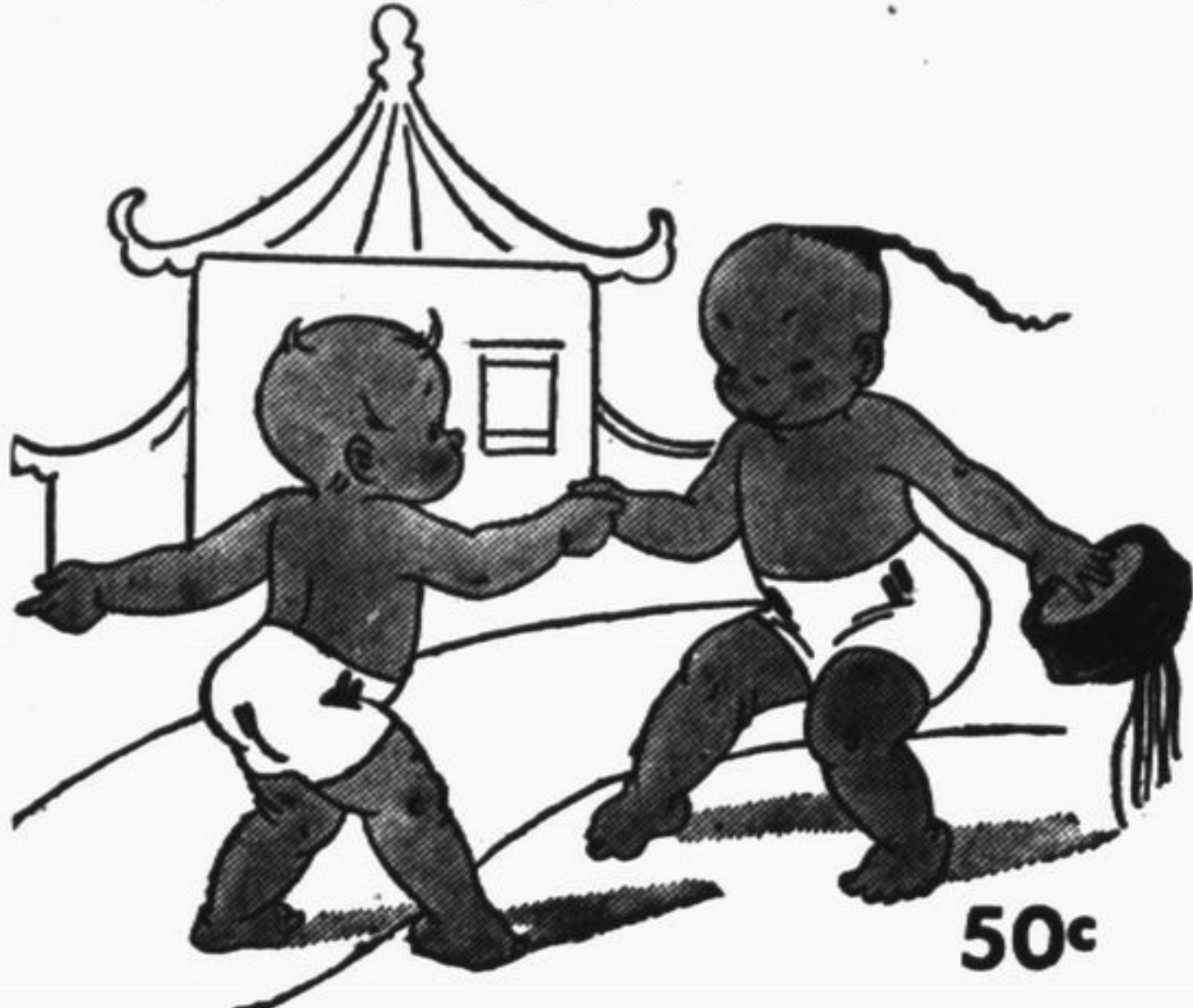
**Will Close Season
