League of Women Voters To Review Year's Work Friday

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The Jury School held in the City Hall Council Chambers under the leadership of Mrs. Philip Ringer. The Council Chambers were packed with many women not league members who, feeling that they might be called for jury service, wanted advance instruction. All winter league members themselves were called to grand jury service in Chicago. Often their league work had to be detailed to other members

while they did their stint on juries but every member who served felt it a privilege of citizenship and well worth any sacrifices they made in a more burdened domestic life. The high compliments of both lawyers and judges on the conscientious service of women jurors was a reward in itself.

The department of Government and Operation under Mrs. James Stannard Baker and Mrs. Van Kirk will report on the conception, birth pangs and actual organization of a Community Council for Highland Park which the league sponsored this year. Mrs. Baker, Mrs. Kirk and their committees studied the subjects of Community Councils in

general and those in Winnetka and Glencoe in detail and then presented their findings to a representative meeting of over sixty Highland Park organizations last month. By next fall it is hoped the Community Council will be a lusty and useful infant.

Mrs. Harold Ray, reporting for the Department of Economic Welfare, will bring the "Know Your Survey" up to date with the latest news on the garbage situation. Years ago the league started agitating for an adequate garbage collecting and disposal system for Highland Park and last spring interviewed every candidate for mayor and city council for their plans and views. Happily this council has taken constructive measures to improve the situation.

The most successful study group of the year was held under the direction of Mrs. Louis Haller and Mrs. Robert Grinnell, co-chairmen with Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer of the Department of Foreign Relations. Feeling that in times like these an intelligent and critical analysis of peace plans is necessary in order to make any contribution towards a better world order, some seventeen women began an intensive study in January, met every week for four months in the Library for a two hour session, read books they borrowed from the University, the Chicago Library, the local library and friends and claimed they had had a more stimulating and instructive time than in any college history course they had ever taken. Studying peace treaties since 1814 they attempted to discover why these had not solved the problems that had brought nations to war and why history has had to repeat itself with more wars and more peace treaties and whether the world will again fail to avert a future conflict in the peace treaty terminating this present war. cent interview Mayor Ronan stated several applicants were under consideration and that an announcement concerning the identity of the new marshal could be expected shortly. In the meantime Sergeant Martin E. Kopp has been performing the duties of former Chief Moroney as acting city marshal.

Commissioner Swanson announced that "Clean-Up" week would start on Monday, May 20 and would continue through Saturday of that week. In his announcement he asked for the cooperation of the citizens of Highland Park in leaving their unwanted debris at the curb where it would be easily accessible to the collectors. He stated that operations during "Clean-Up" week cost the city some three to four hundred dollars and that collections should be made as simple as possible to keep expenses down.

Commissioner Swanson cited several complaints received by his department against parking cars for sale on the parkways at Laurel and First streets and along North St. Johns avenue. Acting City Marshal Kopp was instructed to have his department investigate the matter with an eye towards eliminating this practice.

In his report Commissioner Swanson stated that during the last fiscal year the street department was operated at a saving of approximately \$8,000 when compared with the previous year's figures. Costs in this department for the 1939-1940 period were placed at \$28,000. Expenses during 1938-1939 were put at \$36,000. He also stated that six and a half miles of streets were resurfaced during the past year. Numerous bridge repairs and street lighting improvements were also made.

At Monday evening's meeting the salary schedule of city employees presented at last week's session was officially approved.
