 Mrs. Lee Supple membership chairman reported a paid-up membership of 202 members. Mrs. Carroll Binder, publicity chairman, gave figures which showed Highland Park in the lead in Lake county as to the number of inches of league news in the local papers . . . seventh in the state.

Mrs. Howell Murray, social chairman and her committee, served luncheon to one of the largest gatherings the league has ever held. Among non-member guests at the luncheon was Mr. R. H. Price, principal of District 107. Mayor Ronan came in after luncheon to hear the talk given by Professor Lavis.

Dr. Lavis, associate professor of political science at the University of Chicago had chosen "Can America Stay Neutral" as his topic but in view of fast moving events he stated that he did not wish to be in the position of making any predictions or prophecies. He went on to say that he wished only to think out loud on the implications of the situation in which we find ourselves

today. He spoke of the differences between the situation in this present war and in 1914 where events moved more slowly and where the news was always a day late. Now all of us, by virtue of the radio, have ringside seats. He reviewed the foreign policy adopted by the League of Women Voters and developed each point in the light of a possible allied or German victory. The United States, he said, is the most powerful neutral nation on earth. How thus can we play our hand so that our influence is most powerful and not cast aside? Professor Lavis believes that Hitler can be stymied until elections in November or if there is a German victory before that time the United States won't count. Professor Lavis feels that unity along with intelligent action is imperative at this time.
