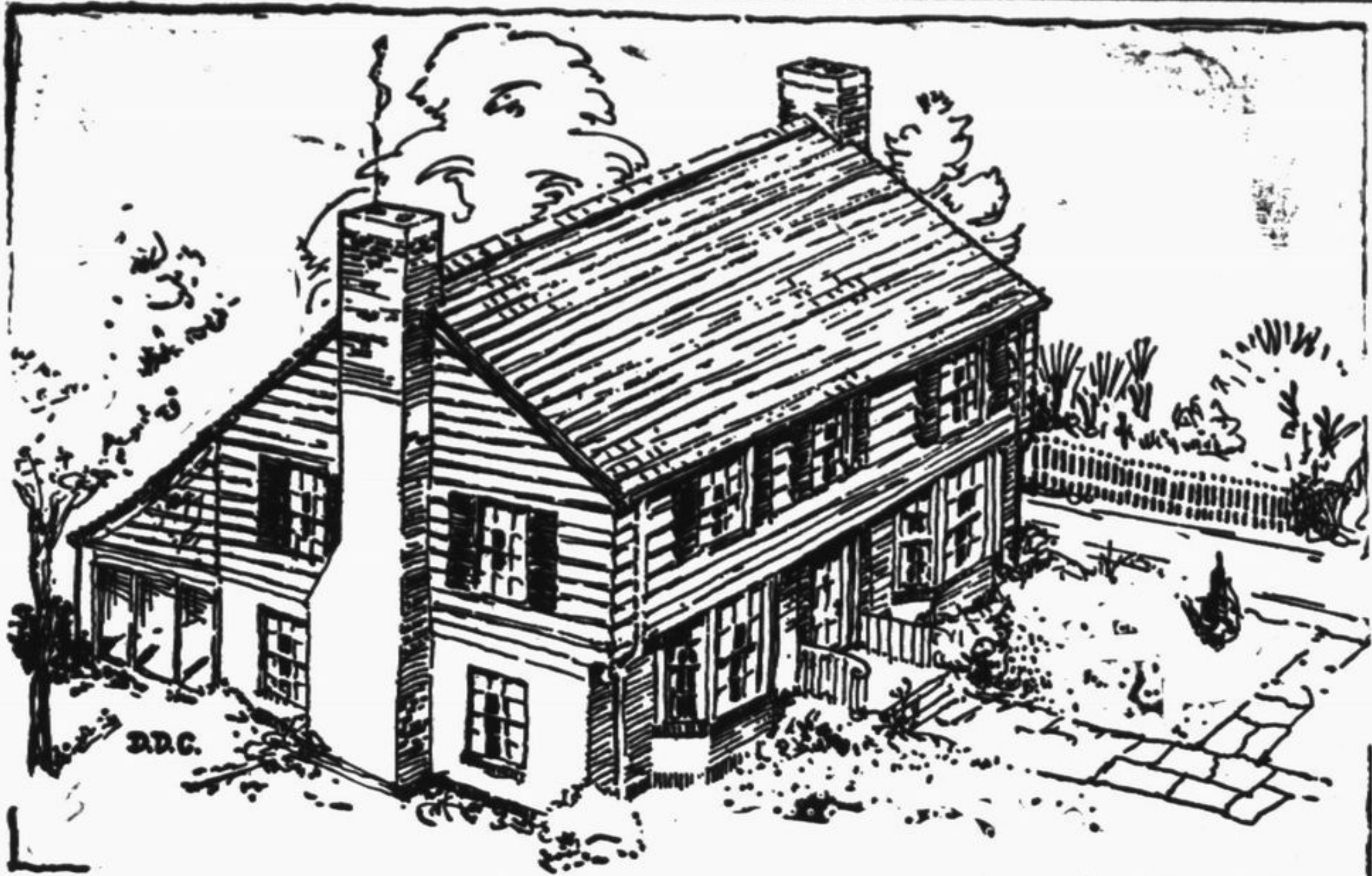

Call for volunteers to serve in the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Day forces is being enthusiastically answered by the young women of Deerfield. Mrs. Ralph Dunham, poppy chairman of the Deerfield Auxiliary unit, announced today.

Organization of the workers who will distribute the memorial poppies throughout the city on Poppy Day, May 27, is proceeding rapidly. The women who are offering their services are being assigned to teams, each of which has a definite part of the village to supply with the little red flowers. Working in relays, they will be on the streets throughout the day.

"The response to the call for Poppy Day workers is very gratifying," said Mrs. Dunham. "It shows that the spirit of patriotism is very much alive in the women of Deerfield today. All will serve as unpaid volunteers, every penny of the money contributed for the poppies going to the Legion and Auxiliary activities for the disabled veterans and dependent families of veterans.

"It is a real sacrifice for many of these women to serve on Poppy Day. They must leave their homes and put in hours of hard, unaccustomed work. Their only reward will be to see the poppies blooming on every coat in tribute to the nation's heroic dead and to feel their coin boxes grow heavy with contributions for the war's living victims. I am sure everyone in Deerfield will appreciate what they are doing and will respond gladly to their appeal to wear a poppy."

Mr. Burwell has made a thorough study the problems of vocational adjustment and will bring a message of a good deal of interest to the graduating class at the Grammar school. A lovely, new, modern and well equipped home is to be given away this summer to help boost and advertise the many advantages of living in the Village of Deerfield. The house is a two story structure 34 feet by 27 feet on a lot 62 feet by 135 feet. It is being erected on Warrington road, two blocks from the business district and one block from the Deerfield Grammar school in Briarwoods subdivision across from the school (the former Knickerbocker farm). The actual cost of the house is to be \$8,500 to \$9,000.

The lower half of the house is of brick veneer and the upper half of siding with six rooms and one and one-half bathrooms. There will be a full basement with room for recreation, also a complete attic. The wiring and plumbing will be the latest and the heating will be hot water by convactor type radiators. The roofing will be thick butt asphalt shingles, and there will be a private garage. The grounds will be beautifully landscaped.

Cooperating in the building of the house and the extolling of Deerfield's advantages are the Chamber of Commerce and the Village Board. Clarence Wilson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, is general chairman; Edward B. Crush, village trustee, is advertising chairman; Edward Segert, carpenter and builder; E. H. Selig, realtor; Walter Lange, painter and decorator; Milton A. Frantz, plumber; Dana R. Corrough, architect; and Burton B. McCoy, attorney.

The finance committee includes Marshall ottenger, Clarence Wilson and Charles J. Turner. The executive committee is: Clarence Wilson, Raymond Meyer, E. H. Selig, Christ M. Willman, Edward B. Crush, and Jirah D. Cole. Mr. Willman is mayor of Deerfield.
