Monday evening's council meeting served as a sort of "breathing spell" between the opening of the bids for the new fire station and incinerator which took place last week and the official awarding of contracts on these projects scheduled for June 17. There will be no public meeting of the council on June 10. Thus, all parties interested in the location of the new incinerator will have plenty of time to oil up their verbal guns for use on June 17 when this momentuous question will finally be settled.

The council chamber was fairly well filled at this week's meeting. The city garage area had a delegation on hand with the expectation that the location of the incinerator would come up for discusion, However, due to the absence of two of the commissioners, Mr. Gourley because of illness, and Mr. Bowes because of business, action on both the incinerator and the fire station was postponed until June 17. The council did, however, vote at Monday's meeting to return the deposit checks of all companies submitting bids on these projects with the exception of the low bidders. Coming under this exception in the case of the incinerator was the Pittsburgh & DeMoines Steel Company, and in the case of the fire station, William Mavor & Co., on construction, Howard Moran on plumbing and heating, and T. H. Decker on heating. It was pointed out that the retention of the deposit checks of these concerns did not necessarily imply that the contracts would be awarded to them. It simply meant that in asmuch as these companies were the low bidders, their bids were eligible for consideration by the council.

of the new incinerator site draws near the opposing forces and lines of arguments between advocates of the two locations to be considered are becoming more clearly defined. Other things being equal, there is no erator placed on the city garage property. The economy of the question from the construction angle and the phase of the problem pertaining to future development of the city's property in this area draws the council strongly in this direction. However, unfortunately for all concerned, other things are apparently not equal and the council is faced with as great or not greater pull in the other direction by the owners of property in the surrounding territory who feel that values would be lowered and life in general made unlivable if the city garage site is selected. From their viewpoint, the most unprejudiced observer will grant their arguments carry great weight. On the other hand, in reaching its decision the council will undoubtedly take into consideration the wishes and welfare of the community as a whole.

All in all, the debate scheduled for June 17 will be one worth attending. At this moment it looks like a sure sell-out for this meeting and anyone wishing to view the proceedings while reclining in a comfortable

\$1306 Is Given To Red Cross Here; **Need More Funds**

About two weeks ago an appeal for \$10,000,000 was asked for relief in the war stricken countries in Europe by the American Red Cross. Chicago area, to which Highland Park belongs, was assigned a quota of \$1,000,000. To date the amount which has been given from Highland Park is \$1,306. The quota has now been lifted with the hope that everyone will do their bit and the amount will be oversubscribed. The need of funds is great as evidenced from the following letter:

Oversubscription Urged To Meet Increased Needs

National Chairman Norman H. Davis has requested all chapters to make a special effort to oversubscribe original minimum quota by generous margins.

"When the American Red Cross asked a minimum war relief fund of \$1,000,000," Mr. Davis telegraphed, "no one could foresee that in two short weeks the greatest tragedy in all history would be unfolded. It is impossible to describe adequately the pitiful plight of millions of refuges in France."

Latest cable advices from Wayne Chatfield-Taylor of Chicago, chief European representative of the American Red Cross, states that Belgian refugees are rushing south-ward toward Paris by the millions.
