enough appropriation is the police department. With the money available, this department has been operating about as efficiently as humanly possible. However, both the city council and the general public are coming to realize that when the lives and welfare of the citizens and children of the community are at stake, the cost should not be the most important factor to consider. The problem of curbing speeding motorists is daily approaching the point where it is getting out of the hands of the police department in its current undermanned state. Particularly during times when the schools are opening or closing or when the rush is on at the railroad stations and in the shopping centers, practically the entire force on active duty is confined to traffic duty in these areas leaving the rest of the streets of the community open to the speeders. The council has been among the first to realize that something must be done to correct this totally unsatisfactory situation. For the moment the council's hands are tied because of the lack of funds to add to the police department's personnel. Additional funds must and will be procured. In the meantime the council is planning on working out a program that will tend to increase the activities of the department in curbing speeding with the available men and equipment.

These are only two of the community's problems now on the council's "must" list for immediate action. Others will be discussed in this column from time to time when the opportunity permits.

Girl Scouts

The last meeting of the Highland Park Girl Scout Council was held Monday at the home of Mrs. Roy O. Nereim.

Mrs. Julius Laegler reported that 25 people took the course on Introduction to Girl Scouting, 15 took Initial Training, 25 took Group Leadership, 9 took Brownie Training, 16 Arts and Crafts, 28 took Troop Committee Training, 15 Singing and Folk Dancing, 14 leaders took training in Outdoor Activities, and 7 Troop Committee members took the course in Outside Activities. This makes a total of 150 persons trained, which makes the largest number of women trained in a single year in Highland Park.

Mrs. Herman A. Zieschke, program chairman, reported that following the five lectures by Mrs. Watts 63 Girl Scouts received the Star Finders Badge. Badges were won in the following fields of interest since last September: Arts and Crafts, 111; Community Living, 2; Dramatics and Literature, 33; Health and Safety, 36; Homemaking, 251; Music and Dancing, 45; Nature, 67; Outdoor, 28; Sports and Games, 70. This makes a total of 647 badges awarded during the year. Forty-six Girl Scouts also have attained First Class ranking.

Girl Scout Organization Growing

In 1937 the Highland Park Girl Scout Council was formed. At that time there were 94 girls registered in the Girl Scouts. In 1938 there were 169 Girl Scouts. In 1939 the total reached 238, and the present registration is 309. In these three years the Girl Scout organization has more than tripled even though there has been no provision made for the Girl Scouts who have gone on into high school, meaning that the girls were dropped from our active membership. It was announced by Mrs. Roy O. Nereim, Highland Park Girl Scout Commissioner, that it is hoped that we will have meeting places this fall in order to offer Senior Girl Scouting to girls of high school age.

Leaders Continue Girl Scouting

There were 22 new leaders in Girl Scouting this year, and all are going to continue to lead troops next year. Twelve leaders are serving their second year. Two are in their third year, and one is in her fourth.

Illinois House Urges Dunes Park As Aviation Base

Immediate acquisition by the federal government of the 2,000 acres of Dunes park property north of Waukegan "as the most logical place for the location of a gigantic aviation base" was unanimously recommended by the Illinois house of representatives last week on the resolution introduced jointly by the three representatives from this district, Nicholas M. Keller, Waukegan; Harold D. Kelsey, Barrington, and Thomas A. Bolger, McHenry.

Here is House Resolution No. 31:

WHEREAS, the federal government has announced a national defense policy which requires fifty thousand fighting planes for the protection of this nation from foreign aggression; and our present landing facilities are totally inadequate to accommodate so large a fleet of planes; and it is desirable that an aviation base be established in this state in order to take advantage of the numerous essential industries in the centrally located Chicago metropolitan area and to secure the economic benefits which will accrue to this state from the construction of additional plant facilities necessitated by the aforesaid program; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the house of representatives of the Sixty-first General Assembly, at the first special session thereof, That we recommend to the proper authorities of Illinois and of the United States the immediate acquisition of the territory, comprising approximately fifteen hundred acres, in the Dunes Park region along the shore of Lake Michigan, between the northern boundary of Illinois and the city of Waukegan and along the right of way of the Chicago and North Western railroad, as the most logical place for the location of a gigantic aviation base, because this territory is the only one of its size and kind now available for such purpose which is still unimproved real estate and affording both land and sea plane facilities both for military needs and future commercial use, extending even to interoceanic transportation; and also because said site borders on Camp Logan, reputedly the world's finest rifle range, and is directly accessible to the army post at Fort Sheridan and the Great Lakes naval training station.
