URGE SAFE AND SANE JULY 4th

The annual toll of injuries resulting from the unrestricted use of fireworks in celebration of the Fourth of July is about to begin.

The Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness for many years has been waging a war against the sale and unrestricted use of fireworks in Illinois.

Last year the total number of injuries in Illinois resulting from fireworks, in connection with the Fourth of July celebrations, was 458, a reduction of fifty-five injuries from the preceding year of 1938.

It is ironically true that the number of deaths caused by fireworks during the last thirty years exceed in number the casualties suffered by the American forces in the Revolutionary War.

In 1939 the deaths of thirteen good Americans were caused by the indiscriminate use of fireworks in nine out of the forty-eight states.

The perennial toll of deaths and injuries from the unregulated use of fireworks continues with grim reality and only will be curbed when all communities awaken to the danger and take proper action to halt traffic in these explosives.

Many cities and towns of Illinois have realized the importance of enacting and enforcing laws against the sale and unrestricted use of fireworks.

The Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness has no quarrel with the pleasure obtained by spectators watching pyrotechnic displays when such exhibitions are staged by pyrotechnic experts.

or other material reward. They represent therefore the citizens' point of view in its most constructive and independent form.

These planks are not new to the League. In fact, both are outgrowths of many years of effort to better the quality of public service and of American foreign relations.

With regard to the tariff plank, the League has studied scientific tariff making ever since 1924, considering the relation of tariff to living costs, to the maintenance of peace or involvement in war, and to the promotion of a new kind of ordered policy that would be adjusted to the welfare of the country as a whole.

Granted that the parties are obliged to set a four-year course at a time when the public mind is aroused by immediate emergencies! Yet the planks offered concern matters bound to be of importance during any administration elected to office next fall, and the League believes it is doing the parties a service to assure them that there are voters who at this time are concerned with long term policies.

As has been its custom for 20 years, the National League of Women Voters will send delegations to both the Democratic and Republican national conventions this summer.

League of Women Voters Ask Party Support of 2 Planks

Asking support for the planks to be presented by the National League of Women Voters to the Republican and Democratic Conventions, Mrs. George G. Bogart, president of the Illinois League of Women Voters, addressed letters this week to the state's delegates.

The letter reads: "As a delegate to one of the National Party Conventions from Illinois you will be interested I am sure in the two planks that the National League of Women Voters will place before the convention for its consideration. The planks are: TARIFF—The party believes that the tariff policy of the U.S. should foster the interest of the country as a whole, not sectional or group interests.

The party believes that efficient and responsive government is necessary to preserve the faith of the people in a democracy. We believe that the merit principle of selecting personnel offers the best method of finding and keeping those persons who will give the public effective service.

Inklings from Neighboring Towns

Building operations on Glencoe's two new theatres have been stopped, pending negotiations of a merger of interests in the two movies by the Glencoe Theater Corporation, which was building on Vernon avenue, south of Hazel avenue, and Sam C. Meyers and A. J. Balaban, who had part of the excavation work done for their proposed theater at the northeast corner of Linden and Scott avenues, in the Hubbard Woods section of Glencoe.

Construction of the Vernon avenue theater is now well underway, with a good portion of the walls completed.

A farewell party to Horace Mann school, Glencoe, was held by teachers and alumni Monday evening. After the end of the school term Friday the building was to be razed to make way for the new Winnetka post office. Moving to the new Crow Island school at Willow road and Glendale avenue began last week.

Northwestern university will participate this summer in the civilian pilot training program of the Civil Aeronautics Authority according to President Franklyn B. Snyder. The university, which offered a training program during the present academic year to 50 students, will have a quota of 75 for the summer.

The course will be sponsored by the Technological institute under the supervision of Professor George A. Maney. Graduates will receive private pilots' certificates from the C.A.A.

The training will include 72 hours of ground school work on the campus and from 35 to 50 hours of flight instruction at Pal-Waukee airport. Eight planes will be reserved for the exclusive use of the students, and five C.A.A. flight instructors will devote full time to the group.

Manuel Hahn, philatelist and member of the Rotary club of Winnetka, was elected governor of the 147th district of Rotary International at the 1940 Rotary convention in Havana, Cuba, last Thursday.

Mr. Hahn will take office on July 1. As district governor and as an officer of Rotary International, he will visit the Rotary clubs in more than 40 cities of Illinois which comprises this Rotary district, and will counsel with and advise Rotary club officers on matters relating to the administration of club affairs.
