CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES
 "Is the Universe, Including Man, Evolved by Atomic Forces?" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, June 23.
 The Golden Text was, "Lo, he that formeth the mountains, and createth the wind, and declareth unto man what is his thought, that maketh the morning darkness, and treadeth upon the high places of the earth, The Lord, The God of hosts, is his name" (Amos 4:13).
 Among the citations which com-posed the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Thus saith God the Lord, he that created the heavens, and stretched them out; he that spread forth the earth, and that which cometh out of it; he that giveth breath unto the people upon it, and spirit to them that walk therein: I am the Lord: that is my name: and my glory will I not give to another, neither my praise to graven images" (Isaiah 42:5, 8).
 The Lesson-Sermon also in-cluded the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The true theory of the universe, in-cluding man, is not in material his-tory but in spiritual development. Inspired thought relinquishes a ma-terial, sensual, and mortal theory of the universe, and adopts the spiri-tual and immortal" (p. 547).

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
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CLOTHING STORE: Al Boskin's clothing store in Joliet, where an effective combination of fluo-rescent and incandescent lighting has been in use for more than a year.
