"Christian Science" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, June 30.

The Golden Text was, "The prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (II Peter 1:21).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them" (Matthew 7:18-20).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Christian Science awakens the sinner, reclaims the infidel, and raises from the couch of pain the helpless invalid. It speaks to the dumb the words of Truth, and they answer with rejoicing. It causes the deaf to hear, the lame to walk, and the blind to see. Who would be the first to disown the Christliness of good works, when our Master says, 'By their fruits ye shall know them?' (p. 342).

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County Permanent Lay Maternal Welfare Committee Meets

A meeting of the Lake County Permanent Lay Maternal Welfare committee was held last Wednesday at the home of the president, Mrs. A. J. Rissinger in Lake Forest. Mrs. Horace Vaile of Highland Park, secretary, had prepared letters to accompany questionnaires to be sent to all young mothers in the county. A list of the births had been obtained through the cooperation of the Zion and Waukegan members of the committee and all assisted in the addressing of the letters that afternoon at Mrs. Rissinger's home. The letter is as follows:

July 1, 1940.

Dear Lake County Mother:

Because the Permanent Lay Maternal Welfare committee feels it is necessary to make a survey of maternity conditions in Lake county, we are sending the enclosed questionnaire to every Lake county mother who gave birth to a child between January 1, 1939, and January 1, 1940. As one of these mothers you are asked to kindly fill out the questionnaire and return it promptly using the enclosed, stamped, addressed envelope for this purpose. We hope all questionnaires will be filled out and returned by August 1, 1940.

Your cooperation is necessary in order to make this survey a success and to secure the statistical data which will be helpful in meeting maternity needs in Lake county. We hope you will feel it a responsibility and a privilege to help furnish the facts that are needed.

The questionnaire contains 35 sections to be answered and the information obtained is solicited for statistical purposes only and will be kept strictly confidential. It asks about mother's employment before birth of child, pre-natal visits to doctor, when first visit was made, what

tests were made, type of birth, hospital or home delivery, length of labor, days in bed after birth, health after birth, type of feeding of baby, age of mother, etc.
