It became necessary to divide the crowd into separate units for the weekly jaunts which have become increasingly popular so that they now have become a fixed and growing institution.

On Sunday, July 21st, the North Shore Hiking Club, sponsored by the Izaak Walton League, will take its every Sunday morning jaunt through a close-by strip of woods (no gravel road this time) along the banks of a creek for a three hour leisurely saunter, with ample rest periods and returning by 1 P. M. or sooner. Rain or shine, as usual, they will leave the parking lot at the west end of Oak street in Winnetka at 9 A. M. sharp. Nearly all are complete strangers up to the time they meet at the place where they assemble. You simply cannot feel like a stranger after you join the crowd.

Both men and women of all creeds and all ages are welcome. Come dressed in old and comfortable clothes. Bring your car if you have one but show up regardless as they always seem to have more than enough cars to transport the gang from the meeting place to the point of the beginning of the walk. There

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is no time for ritual or rules and no cost whatsoever is involved except the effort of operating on your own power. The choice of routes is left almost entirely up to the hikers themselves with an occasional dead-end lock good naturedly resolved by a vote of the majority thus avoiding any needless bloodshed. On July 28th a more hungry portion of the group have decided to take along their respective lunches on a colossal and special hike to the hilly lake country near the Fox river twenty-five miles driving distance from Winnetka. For those who wish to return by 1:45 P. M. on this future hike plans will be made to bring them back before the return of the all day bunch. They operate 52 Sundays a year no matter what the weather. Bring your camera or your dog if you have him or her under control.
