Hospital Facts by Crawford

My first impression of the Highland Park hospital was that it is a little city housed inside walls and ceilings. Many residents in Highland Park do not realize how completely modern our hospital is. It has everything from a miniature laundry to ice machines . . . with

every ounce of space utilized Under the direction of modest and efficient Miss Marjorie M. Ibsen, the hospital makes the utmost use of its up-to-date surgical and medical equipment. Included in some of the fine facilities are an iron lung and huge X-ray machines. Saving much time in removing emergency patients to the operating room, a new elevator has been installed, which has an outlet to the emergency entrance at the rear of the hospital.

Not only has professional equipment been improved with the times, but the grounds and buildings have also been ameliorated. Clavey nurseries recently donated shrubs for the rear grounds of the hospital. The gardens are beautified by competent caretakers.

Everything is run smoothly in our hospital. One department is interconnected and is dependent upon another. It has services in general medicine, general surgery, cancer, dermatology, gynecology, neurology, obstetrics and many other medical catagories. It can handle 45 adults and five children, and at the moment has approximately 35 adults and 14 babies under observation. The largest baby weighs 8 lbs. 11 oz., while the smallest tips the scales at only 2 lbs. 10 oz.




