

Chambers Wins Championship

Mike Stolarik of Waukegan, left, and Champion Bill Chambers thrilled a huge gallery in the final 36 holes of the first annual Lake county championship amateur golf tourney held Sunday at the Bonnie Brook municipal links. Chambers nipped Stolarik by a single stroke for the title in the 72-hole medal play grind. Bill's 293 was only one over par for the 72 holes. His appearance in the county classic marked the first time he had played at Bonnie Brook in something like five years. A Highland Park resident, he is 28 years old and is employed in a Chicago brokerage firm. Stolarik was the star of Waukegan high's golf team this spring, winning the state district title and finishing second in the finals of the state prep meet at Peoria. Mike also is a former Chicago district caddy titleholder.

Bill Chambers Wins First Lake County Amateur Tourney

Bill Chambers, two-time winner of invitational county tournaments Sunday, won the first official Lake county amateur golf championship in the 72-hole medal play meet staged under the auspices of the Bonnie Brook Golf association at the local municipal course, finishing with a 293 aggregate.

Chambers, 28-year-old Highland Park star, played brilliantly to annex the title, overcoming a four-stroke lead that Mike Stolarik held as the pair teed off for the final 18 holes Sunday afternoon. In doing it, he demonstrated that he has the sound, almost flawless game, a sturdy competitive heart, and irrefragable spirit that help to make champions.

In his march to the title, stroke by stroke, in his sure footed, deliberate way, Chambers fired four fine rounds of golf, climaxed by his sizzling 69, four under par, on the final 18 holes. He shot 73-75 on Saturday, a 76 yesterday morning and then proceeded to birdie seven holes on the last 18 for his sub-par 69.

Stolarik, who had 72-76 Saturday to deadlock Chambers for the first day's lead, shot a 72 yesterday morning to take a four stroke edge as he and Chambers teed off in the afternoon with a gallery of several hundred links enthusiasts following them. Both treated the onlookers to some red-hot golf, Chambers carding a 34 and Stolarik a 35 on the outgoing nine. The Highland Park ace posted 35 on the incoming nine and Mike had a 39.

Golfers have been blessed with some fine weather during the last week, and have been taking advantage of it. On the golf course it is just cool enough for a light sweater, and the sun has helped to keep the links crowded.

Yesterday Exmoor celebrated its annual invitational tournament, the "Jamboree," in which nearly 200 golfers participated. Prizes were awarded to the winning foursome, also a blind bogey prize, guest and host prize, low net prize and low gross prize. The huge traditional celebration extended far into the night.

Saturday, July 20, Exmoor will have match play against par for men only, and also the third round match play of the club and class championships. On Sunday the final round of the championships will be played, 36 holes for the club championship and 18 holes for the class championship. A blind bogey will also be featured.

Thursday the 25th will be the advent of the annual two-ball foursomes at Exmoor. The two-ball foursomes events continue every Thursday throughout August. The Benedict cup will be awarded to the winner of this initial two-ball event. July 27 will feature a medal play handicap at the local club.

In the first round of the club and class championships at Exmoor, T. B. Singleton beat W. H. Morton; R. G. Gambrell beat H. O. McClain; J. D'Esposito defeated T. C. Butts; J. O. Giles beat Dr. A. F. Darro; J. B. Stevens won over H. E. Edson; J. P. Bowes took honors over R. Zeddis; Jack Landreth won a default over George Rasmussen and C. K. Morris beat J. W. Evers.

In the only match played in the second round of the Exmoor championships, J. O. Giles beat J. D'Esposito.

Results of the mens' driving contest held at Lakeshore Country club July 14 are as follows: First: Wm. Swartschild Jr., with an average drive of 222 yards; John Coleman, second, with an average yardage of 215 on his drives; third in this event was G. G. Stern with an average of 212 yards.

Mrs. W. G. Swartschild Jr. recently won the annual ladies' 16 hole handicap tourney with a net of 63. Mrs. R. D. Michaels took second position with a 64 net and Mrs. M. J. Speigal Jr., and Mrs. S. L. Schwartz tied for third place with 67 net.

Lakeshore will present their annual Sunset tourney on July 18, according to golf shop authorities. "Woo" eightsomes will compete in this mens' nine hole event, sources pointed out. July 20 will be the date of mens' medal play vs. par in an 18 hole match handicap. A mens' blind bogey will be featured by Lakeshore on July 21.

Northmoor Country club and Lakeshore will compete in a 36 hole tournament on July 27 and 28, authorities pointed out. Officials will

pick the best low handicap players of each club. The qualifying round of the annual womens' handicap tourney will be played July 29 at Lakeshore.

Such women golf notables as Shirley Ann Johnson and Virginia Ingram, both of Sunset Ridge Golf club, will compete in the womens' Chicago district tournament play-off at Northmoor Country club this week, club authorities disclosed today. About 120 women are entered in this tourney, after which prizes will be awarded, sources stated.

Today, the mixed Sunset tourney, a nine hole event, is being staged at Northmoor. The semi-finals of the president's cup tournament will be held at Northmoor July 20. Sunday the final round of the president's cup will be played.

Sunset Valley club of Highland Park will feature its "Tombstone" tournament on the 28th of July. Tom Kelly, professional, disclosed today. Any man in Highland Park may enter this event, he stated. Next Monday, the annual Highland Park Open will be held at Sunset Valley, he said.

With a little more summer heat, and a little less wintry blasts, the local links should be extremely popular as the annual golf peak nears, and July ends.
