## Deerfield Owners Have Registered Breed on Honor List

Brattleboro, Vt. June 28—C. E. Rudolph, Deerfield, has a registered Holstein-Friesian cow on the national Honor List, the Holstein-Friesian Association of America has just announced. The honor list has been published annually by the association for more than 40 years and contains the names and records of the leading Advanced Registry producers of each year.

Mr. Rudolph's honor list cow, the senior 3-year-old Old Mill Matchless Donna Maid, produced 699.3 pounds butterfat in 364 days on three milkings daily, and ranks 19th among all honor list cows in the country in her classification and division.

R. V. Rasmussen, also of Deerfield, has a registered Holstein-Friesian cow on the national honor list, the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Mr. Rasmussen's honor list cow, the 4-year-old Bessie Armsby Fayne Lady, produced 755.8 pounds butterfat in 365 days on three milkings daily, and ranks 11th among all honor list cows in the country in her classification and division.

## Letter to Deerfield Residents Explains Financial Status

The following letter is being sent out this week to Deerfield residents in their water bills. It is a financial explanation by the Village Finance committee:

The fiscal year ended in April. Your village is \$5,929.71 better off than one year ago. The actual audit shows we are \$8,808.86 worse off than one year ago. The reason for our first statement, however, is due to judgments against the village for \$14,738.57 being for the first time, set up on the audit, though the judgments have been in effect for some years for misapplication of special assessment funds by village officials during 1932.

Our better financial condition is reflected in every department of the village. One of the primary reasons for this is that for the first time in many years your village board did not borrow any money on tax anticipation warrants but lived within its income. The income showed some increase, too. This was due in part to enforcing the ordinances regarding licenses for dogs and vehicles which have always been on the books but not rigidly enforced. It is unfair for some to pay and others not. Therefore, these ordinances are being enforced as they were last year.

The present fiscal year has started off with the same goal in mind—namely, that of living within our income.

A splendid audit report has been made by our auditor, Mr. Roderick, which may be examined by any interested citizen at the Village hall, or by seeing any one of the trustees.
