The association, working in cooperation with the Republican State Central committee, will be host to all state candidates on the Republican ticket and all newspaper editors of the state have been invited. Brooks, who is the Republican candidate for United States Senator, and Dwight H. Green, the nominee for governor, will be the headline speakers.

County Republican chairmen, office-holders, and nominees for county and legislative offices from all sections of the state have been invited. Early reports and acceptances indicate an attendance of 2,500 or more persons.

A barbecue meal with all of the "trimmings" will be served free at noon, and an entertainment program, as well as speaking program, has been arranged.

As late as 1906, says the Illinois Writers' Project, W.P.A., a Montgomery county newspaper was calling attention to the lack of adequate hitching facilities for the farmers' horses. The courthouse square in Hillsboro was crowded with teams,
