**Inklings from Neighboring Towns**

The Winnetk Garden club is setting a precedent in north shore communities for its method of exterminating to some degree, Ragweed. They are offering cash prizes to children of grammar school age for the greatest amount of rag weed which is brought in to be disposed off. All plants must be pulled up by the roots, tied in bundles of 50 and brought to the Skokie Playfield, where they will be disposed of. Altho the Ragweed control is no easy task, this will to some degree help to eliminate its spread, and will make the public more conscientious minded of the misery hay fever sufferers experience during the pollination season of this noxious weed.

Mrs. Claire Turner, of Rushmore road, Fox Lake, may not rate very high as a marksman with a revolver, but her methods are effective when it comes to routing prowlers. Having heard prowlers around her home for several evenings, she prepared herself to meet the transgressor. When he appeared early one morning last week, she quietly slipped out of the back door with her revolver in hand, and as the figure of a man moved toward her, she aimed and fired. The intruder raced down the lawn an escape, leaving a pair of shoes an his hat in his flight. The man's identity was discovered by the name which appeared in the hat.

The date for the formal dedication of the Lake County Tuberculosis Sanatorium in Waukegan has been changed from Sunday, July 28th to Sunday, August 18th. The complete program of the dedication ceremonies will be announced later.

This evening (Thursday) the Glencoe playgrounds in conjunction with the Glencoe Park Board are sponsoring a water carnival with races, bathing beauty contest, diving exhibition, comedy stunts and a life saving demonstration at the Glencoe Park avenue beach.

The attendance at the Park avenue beach has been very good but below last year's attendance. The average attendance has been 365 daily as compared to 590 last season.

Plans for the improvement of Western avenue near the Northwestern railway platform and the

resurfacing of the driveway into the Northwestern railway station in Lake Forest have been announced by the Lake Forest city officials. Lake Forest will assume the cost of the labor necessary to complete these improvements while the railway company will pay for the cost of labor.

Zion officials have requested the citizens to conserve the city's water supply by refraining from excess usage such as lawn and garden sprinkling during the heat wave. According to City Clerk John D. Luce, their plant can furnish just so much water, and this is being dissipated rapidly. In a time of emergency, a dangerous situation would arise because of shortage.

**Deadline for Jobless Fund Payment Near**

Contributions to the Illinois Unemployment Compensation fund for the second quarter of 1940 are now due and must be paid by July 31, H. N. Stout, field adviser for the Division of Placement and Unemployment Compensation, warned local employers today.

"All employers in Lake and McHenry counties should check their liability under the job insurance law immediately," said Mr. Stout. "A large group of Illinois employers will have to report this month for the first time. The newly liable employers are those who employed at least six individuals in each of 20 weeks during the first half of this year and who were not previously subject to the law." "Employers previously liable are those conducting any business, service, manufacturing or mining concern that employed six or more individuals in each of any 20 weeks of 1939."

Mr. Stout pointed out that employers do not have to pay contributions on wages in excess of the first \$3,000 paid to an individual worker in 1940 or thereafter. If a worker receives \$600 a month regularly, for example, the employer would report and pay contributions on that man's wages for the first five months of the year. Wages received by that worker from the same employer in June or thereafter would not be subject to contribution.

The contribution rate remains at 2.7 percent of wages payable. Contributions must be post-marked not later than midnight, July 31, to avoid delinquency. Interest at the rate of 1 percent a month accrues on all delinquent payments. Checks should be made payable to the Director of Labor and mailed, with wage and contribution reports, to

the Division of Placement and Unemployment Compensation, Merchandise Mart, Chicago. Employers in the area were urged by Mr. Stout to get in touch with him if they have any questions regarding liability, contribution payments or wage and contribution reporting. The field adviser makes his headquarters at the Illinois State Employment Service Office, 20 S. Utica street, Waukegan.
