Miss Schreiber was riding in the gasoline coach that was struck by a Pennsylvania railroad freight train near Akron. All of the passengers in the car but one were burned to death.

Besides her parents, Jo Anne is survived by her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Philip Schreiber of 520 Glencoe Ave., an aunt, Mrs. Robert M. Cobb, 261 Laurel Ave., Highland Park, and her grandmother in Ohio.
