One has read thousands of type lines concerning conscription in the papers during recent weeks. Isolationists, appeasers and what have you, complain bitterly. Of course, they offer no other method to substitute for this movement, but they howl about their "rights" just the

Many isolationists maintain that conscription is the initial step toward complete totalitarianism in the United States. In their minds this may be true. But little do they think of the inevitable position we will be forced to stand if Britain falls Po.and, Norway, Austria and France took life easy until the wolf was haunting their doors. We don't relish the thought of our being in the same predicament.

Proponents of conscription are genuine defenders and patriots of the nation. It has been proven that any mediation, verbal propitiations, promises or paper treaties mean very little to the German dictator.
