School Bus System To Be Tested Soon

Springfield (AP)—Illinois school bus drivers and the vehicles they operate will have to take their examinations before the fall semester begins, it was announced today by the state superintendent of public instruction. Drivers and busses failing to pass the tests won't be allowed to transport children to school.

Before the school bus goes into operation next term, the driver must secure a permit to drive it from the county superintendent of schools and the bus, itself, must pass muster before inspectors of the state division of motor carriers.

In addition to motor carriers division inspectors, state police, safety engineers, driver's license examiners and investigators for the automobile department will have a hand in the examinations, the public instruction office announced.

Highland Park in Lead in County Building in July

New home-building continued to keep Highland Park and Waukegan far in the front of Lake county building activities for the second consecutive month with totals of \$121,526 and \$103,760, respectively.

According to a survey for July made public yesterday by the Bell Savings and Loan association, Waukegan was ahead in the number of new residences with 19, but Highland Park was the leader in value with nine new homes worth \$98,109. The value of Waukegan homes was \$71,975.

North Chicago Third
Following Highland Park and Waukegan in total construction values were North Chicago with \$36,445; Lake Forest, \$31,350; Libertyville, \$11,560; Lake Bluff, \$11,400; and Barrington, \$3,000.

Lake Forest did not report a single new home in the city's July figures. North Chicago reported two new homes worth \$11,900. Lake Bluff, one for \$7,500; Libertyville, one for \$6,200 and Barrington, one for \$3,000.

Suburban building for July set a new record in the entire Chicago area with \$9,465,203, the largest total since the survey was started in 1931. This is an increase over July of last year of 160 percent and over June of this year of 94 percent.

Old Age Assistance Shows July Increase

State Auditor, Edward J. Barrett, has issued the following statement in reference to the Old Age Assistance for the month of July:

Old Age Assistance continues to increase each month. The warrants issued for the month of July, 1940 were 138,453 amounting to \$2,911,697.

The warrants issued for the month of June, 1940 were 138,101. Thus July showed an increase of 352 warrants and an increase of \$33,653, as the amount paid out on warrants for June was \$2,878,044 and for July, \$2,911,697.

Indications are that there will be a steady increase each month.
