**Fourteenth Annual Daily News Regatta Planned for Sunday**

One of the world's mightiest displays of boat and water stunts, drawing thousands of competitors and stunts from the entire Lake Michigan area, will take the stage Sunday afternoon, Aug. 25, off Chicago's Navy Pier during the 14th annual Chicago Daily News Regatta. The Daily News event is the world's largest fresh-water regatta and is entirely free to the public. Its purpose is not only to provide the biggest open competition for yachtsmen on Lake Michigan but also to give water lovers a huge panorama proving that Chicago ranks among the world's leading boating centers for pleasure and racing.

One hundred thousand persons witnessed last year's regatta from the pier, adjacent points on shore and innumerable spectator parties on pleasure craft near the pier. The pier itself is an ideal grandstand of unlimited facilities for viewing an afternoon of unbroken events which run off like clockwork.  
More than 30 different classes of sail yachts from 10-foot dinghies to 60-foot yachts will compete on four separate triangular courses, all within sight of the pier. The first class starts at 1 o'clock, with additional classes starting every five minutes afterward until 2:30.  
More than 100 dinghies in six classes will race beginning at 11 a.m. After the bigger sail boats are on their way past the pierhead, six classes of small sail boats will race just north of the pier.  
Several classes of glistening

**power craft will turn their throttles wide open in races to the south of the pier. Each of the five courses displays an unending parade of boats.**

Some 350 Sea Scouts from squadrons throughout the Chicago council, largest of all, will row their big cutters along the south side of the pier and run through colorful drills.  
The Chicago Park district's expert stunters will perform on water skis, aquaplanes, surfboards and other equipment, and will compete in rowing races and precision drills.  
Chuck Sligh of Holland, Mich., world's foremost water ski artist, will bring his own troupe for a hair-raising show. The fireboat Fred Busse will present an actual fire drill close to the spectators.

One of the largest fleets of Coast Guard craft ever assembled will patrol the regatta, and among them will be the white 165-foot cutter Escanaba, which will be open for public inspection at the south end of the pier.  
Parents are reminded that The Daily News spectacle is especially suited for children to watch. Every activity in the day-long show will be explained dramatically by David C. Zimmerman, former commodore of the Lake Michigan Yachting association, which sanctions the regatta, over a multiple public-address system. Zimmerman is recognized as the No. 1 yachting commentator. Byron H. Willis, Chicago Yacht club race chairman and internationally known yachting figure, is general chairman. His committees include more than 75 co-workers.

By means of the public address system, "land-lubbers" anxious to know more of boat racing tactics and other water routines will have an unparalleled chance to learn much about the grandest of summer sports.

**Helen Margolyne Talented Soprano In Final Concert**

Helen Margolyne, beautiful and talented soprano of the Chicago Opera company, will appear as soloist on the final free outdoor concert in the Illinois Symphony Orchestra's series of "Starlight Symphonies" in Wilmette Amphitheatre, Wednesday evening (August 28). Ralph Rose, summer guest conductor of the orchestra, will make his fourth Wilmette appearance of the season.

Since 1938, when she made her debut with the opera company, Miss Margolyne has advanced rapidly to a position among the top-flight vocalists of the Middle West. She has been featured as soloist in Grant Park concerts as well as with the Illinois Symphony Orchestra on many occasions. On Wednesday evening the young soprano will sing two arias, "Mon coeur ne peut changer," from "Mireille" by Gounod and "Merce, dilette amiche," from "I Vespri Siciliani" by Verdi.  
An exceptionally attractive program of better known works has been listed for the final concert. Perhaps the most familiar of the selections to be played is the Overture Fantasia, "Romeo and Juliet" by Tchaikowsky. The program also includes the Overture to "Oberon" by Weber, Bizet's "L'Arlesienne" Suite, the Fantasia, "A Night on the Bald Mountain" by Moussorgsky, and a Strauss waltz, "Vienna Life."

The concert will conclude with a work introduced to Chicago this season by the Illinois Symphony Orchestra during their regular downtown season, The Dance of the Masked Devil, from the Native African Ballet, "Poru," by Galen Holcomb.

The Barrington Fire department is joining with the newly organized Sportsmen's club in holding the first race. Part of the proceeds of the race will be used to purchase safety and first aid equipment for the department.
