Dr. Herbert Prince Of Lake Forest May Become Bishop

Dr. Herbert W. Prince, rector of the Church of the Holy Spirit, Lake Forest, is included in a list of 41 Episcopal clergymen eligible for bishop, to be selected September 24, to succeed the late Bishop George Craig Stewart.

Dr. Prince, rector at Lake Forest for 16 years, is chairman of the social service department of the diocese. He has shown his leadership ability not only in his own parish but in the wider interests of the diocese and the church.

The election will be held September 24 in the Church of the Epiphany, Chicago. The special committee was named after the death of Bishop Stewart last spring to investigate the qualifications and eligibility of possible successors.

Bishop Edwin S. Randall, suffragan bishop who has administered the diocese in the interim, has announced that he will not be a candidate.
