There will be a meeting of the entire district faculty at 2:30 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, September 4th, at the Lincoln school.

The Elm Place and Greenbay road schools will open at 9 o'clock on Thursday morning, September 5. All children who were in school last year should report to their last year's home rooms. They will then be assigned to their new home room teachers. Kindergarten children should report to the kindergarten teachers, Miss Marks at Elm Place, and Miss Deile at Greenbay road school. Kindergarten pupils must be 5 years of age before January 1. Children who did not register in kindergarten last spring must be accompanied by birth certificates for registration.

All other new pupils should register at the office of the principal of the school which they will attend. Registrations of pupils above kindergarten may be made on Wednesday afternoon, September 4.

Textbooks will be for sale in the Elementary building of the Elm Place school from 9 until 12 o'clock and from 1 until 4 o'clock on Wednesday, September 4. First and second grade children of both schools will get their books from their teachers during the first few days of school. All other children should buy their books at the Elm Place school book store.

Miss Virginia Sproul of Quincy, Ill., has been employed as music teacher at Elm Place school for this year. Miss Sproul received the Master of Arts degree in Music at the University of Michigan this summer. Her thesis was an operetta which received honors rating. Miss Sproul has taught music at Carthage college, and in the public schools of Earlville, Ill.; Preston, Iowa, and Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. She comes to Highland Park from Wauwatosa.

Miss Alice Beyer has been employed to teach English in the 8th grade. Miss Beyer received her Master of Arts degree from Northwestern university this summer. During last year she did internship teaching at Maine Township High school.

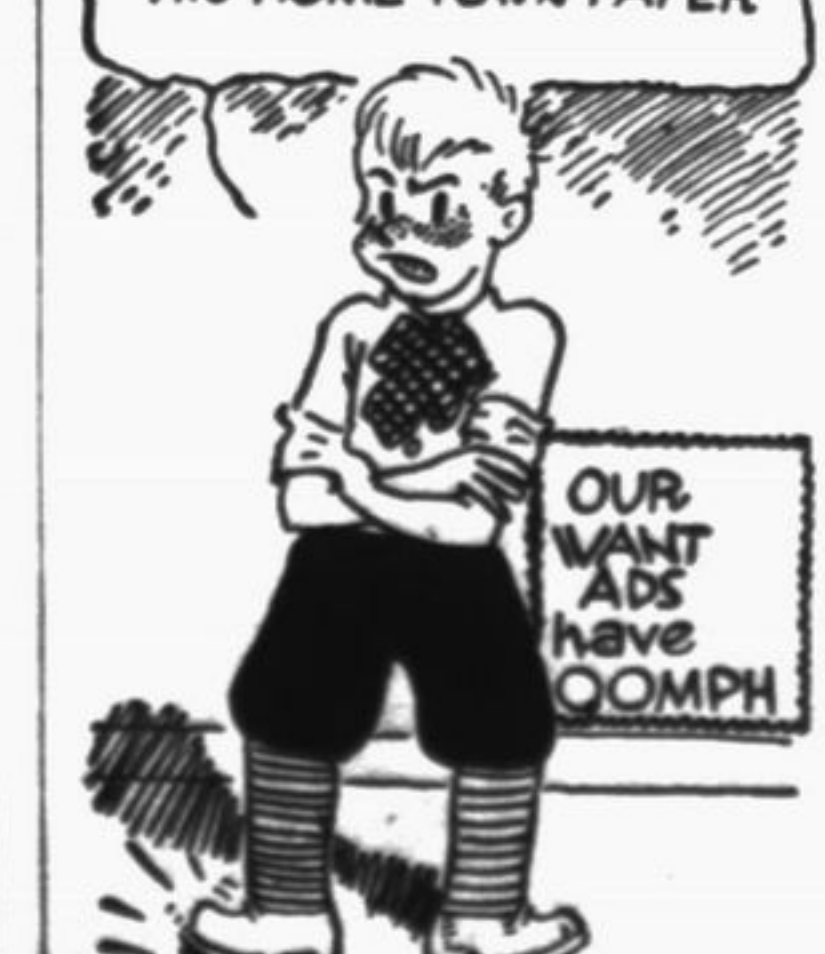

at the bottom is finished in a black chemical resistant material. This toe-space makes it comfortable to stand at the table. The chemical resistant finish allows strong mopping solutions to be used on the floor without spoiling the tables.

All metal ware, books, glassware, and apparatus will be kept in a storage which covers the entire south end of the laboratory. All chemicals will be kept in the store-room. Pupils will secure their chemical from the reagent bottles kept on the reagent shelves in the laboratory. A special acid table is used for the dispensing of strong acids and bases. A steady stream of water flushes off the top of this table at all times when the laboratory is in use. A shower bath and several first aid kits are also available.

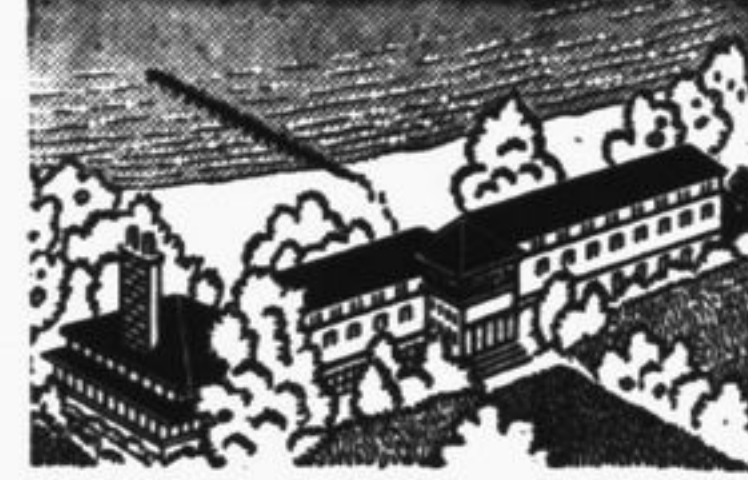
Dessert Luncheon Sept. 11
