Worker Fatally Injured In Fall Off Fort Scaffold

Breaking his neck in a 12-foot fall from a scaffold at Fort Sheridan Thursday afternoon, John T. Nessa, 66, of Long Lake, a WPA worker, died a few minutes later in the Fort Sheridan hospital.

Fellow employees testified at an inquest that Nessa, a carpenter, was preparing to quit work at 4 p.m. on the gun-carriage garage now under construction when he lost his balance and plunged to the ground.

Semi-conscious, the aged man was rushed to the Fort Sheridan hospital. He died of a broken neck a few minutes after his arrival.

A coroner's jury at Kelley's funeral home, 27 N. Sheridan rd., Friday morning returned a verdict of accidental death.

Nessa is survived by his wife Ranghild and three children by a previous marriage, Brighth Nessa of Chicago, Mrs. Anna Anderson of Ludington, Mich. and a son Nicolai of Stavenger, Norway. Funeral services were held Tuesday at Long Lake. Interment was in Fox Lake cemetery.

August Building Reaches New Peak For 1940 Record

Highland Parks total August building valuation of \$131,534 is the highest for the year, according to Building Inspector Sidney Morris, who reported that a total of 22 permits in all had been taken out. Of this number 15 are for new dwellings. The residential construction is valued at \$121,265.

Last month the building valuation was \$121,526, and in August 1939 the total was a skimpy \$63,419.

Accumulated valuations for the first eight months of this year in Highland Park are \$698,765 compared with \$684,944 for the same period a year ago.

August's building boom enabled the 1940 accumulated valuation for the first time to exceed that of 1939.

Among the permits issued this month for new dwellings were those to Walter Amstern, 2533 Green Bay road, \$12,000; J. R. Alford, Brittany lane, \$13,565, and Gilbert H. Finch, \$14,833.

A good, old-time recipe for polishing one of the best and least expensive floor stains is made of permanganate of potash. Mix one-quarter pound of potash in one quart of water. Apply one coat for a light brown and two for a dark brown shade. The color is at first a bright magenta, which immediately turns brown. When the stain is dry, oil with beeswax and turpentine for an "oak" finish.
