# I LOVE MY DOG YOU LOVE YOURS

# Let's play fair with each other

I am faced with a serious problem. As your Chief of Police, it is my duty to collect the tax which by legal ordinance has been assessed against every dog in the City of Highland Park.

Our canine population is about 1,500 animals. Since July 1, when the dog tax for 1940-41 became due, only about 800 owners have voluntarily paid their dog license fee. More than 700 of our citizens are not only delinquent, but are in violation of the law and thereby subject to penalty.

But the last thing your law enforcement agency desires to do, is to enforce any penalties. I know that ours is a law abiding community. I believe that dog owners are not deliberate "cheats."

Most people are just careless about this matter. But carelessness can no longer be accepted as an excuse for a flagrant violation of a legal as well as a moral obligation.

In years passed, it has been the custom for the Chief of Police to assign officers to go out and collect our dog tax from door to door. That custom was unfair to the men and was unfair to you as a taxpayer. Every

officer taken from regular police duty deprives us of just that much protection. And as it is, we are seriously short handed.

So I have decided to make a "man to man" appeal to you, my neighbors, who are also my employers, in the firm belief that you will not let me down.

I love my dog. You love yours. The tax we pay for him is a small enough tribute to his affection and loyalty.

Now here is my proposal in a few simple words: Let's show our sportsmanship, so that we can play fair with each other. The police department is ready and eager to cooperate by protecting your dog.

WILL YOU DO YOUR PART BY PAY-ING YOUR DOG TAX TODAY?

This offer is open for 30 days. If, at the end of that period there are still unlicensed dogs in our city ,their owners must assume full liability.
