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3495 Pupils Enroll In Local Schools

Three thousand four hundred and ninety-five children have enrolled in Highland Park and Highwood schools, since the opening last Thursday. Of this number 1270 are enrolled at Highland Park high school. There are still some students who have not enrolled, who will no doubt return within a week or so. This year's enrollment at high school is only 35 above last year's figure.

In District 107, there are 160 enrolled at Green Bay Road school and 565 at Elm Place making a total of 725 which is an increase of 25 over last year. It is expected that about 45 more will be added in the next week. The first grade attendance was so large that it was found necessary to add another teacher to the staff. Miss Paddie Freeman who taught in St. George's Private school, Montreal, Canada has been secured for the position. She is a graduate of National college of Education and Northwestern university.

District 108 shows an enrollment of 1060 against 1047 last year's figure. It is expected that there will be a slight increase in the above figure. Ravinia has 414 students against last year's 423; Lincoln 345 against 359; Braeside 239 with 212 last year and Ridge 62 with 53 a year ago.

Oak Terrace school in Highwood showed a decrease this year, there being 440 enrolled which is 27 less than a year ago.
