
H.S. Football Teams Win Opening Games; **Downers Grove Next**

Taylor G. Soper, executive secretary of the Illinois Road Builders association, Chicago, addressed the Highland Park Rotary club Monday at its noon day meeting at Sunset Valley club. He talked on "High-

"While the nation is rushing pellmell to arms, an important defense factor is being overlooked-obsolete roads,' declared Mr. Soper. Our defense plans call for an army that can be dispatched quickly to any threatened area, but how will this army reach its destination? More than 100,000 miles of the nation's primary roads are rated as obsolete.

"It is not only a question of getting troops into specified areas. Supplies, the lifeline of any army, must proved, modernized highways are en, Bonita Granville, Ezra (Henry the only solution."

Soper, in referring to the highway situation in Illinois, stated that diversions of highway user taxes takes some six million dollars away from state road construction each


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
