Rev. J. C. Leuder Dies; Was Former **Deerfield Pastor**

The Rev. John C. Lueder, who was the oldest Evangelical Lutheran minister in the U.S. died Tuesday, Sept. 17, in the German Deaconess hospital, Chicago. He was 93 years old. Educated in Germany, the Rev. Dr. Lueder came to this country in 1870 and began his ministry at Beaver Bay, Minn., in 1872. After that he occupied pastorates at Crown Point and Michigan City, Ind., and Deerfield.

From Deerfield (he was pastorhere during the World War) he went to Elmhurst, where for 29 years he was professor of dead languages at Elmhurst college. He was professor emeritus at the time of his death. Since retiring the Rev. Dr. Lueder has made his home at 9955 Charles street, Chicago. Surviving are three sons, Arthur C. Lueder, former Chicago postmaster and now Republican candidate for state auditor; John T. of Chicago and George of Elmhurst; seven grandchildren and eight grandchil-

Funeral services were held Friday at St. Peter's church in Elmhurst and burial was at Elm Lawn.
