Residing next door to us, as a roomer in our neighbor's home, was James J. Davis, senator from Pennsylvanit, who at that time served as city clerk. My father as then councilman from the second ward, and Herman Willkie was police judge. Davis served as secretary of labor under Harding and Coolidge's administrations.

"Our local high school was on 18th street between Main and A streets. On back of the high school was a field where all of us youngsters would gather to play the familiar games of those early days.
