And when it was day, he departed and went into a desert place; and the people sought him, and came unto him, and stayed him, that he should not depart from them. And he said unto them, I must preach the kingdom of God to other cities also: for therefore am I sent" (Luke 4:40, 42, 43).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Reason, rightly directed, serves to correct the errors of corporeal sense; but sin, sickness, and death will seem real (even as the experiences of the sleeping dream seem real) until the Science of man's eternal harmony breaks their illusion with the unbroken reality of scientific being" (p. 494).

Illinois Opera Guild Workers Meet Oct. 4

The Highland Park Division of the Subscription Committee of the Illinois Opera Guild in session with the local chairman, Mrs. Harry L. Canmann, approved the ensuing proposal:

Inasmuch as many actively functioning members of the committee find it inexpedient to purchase season tickets for the opera the chairman will be authorized to make the following suggestion in writing to the members of the committee:

That a limited number of season tickets for the several subscription nights and Saturday matinees be purchased and distributed in accordance with the wishes of each individual relative to the time and number of performances. This privilege may be extended to family and friends. The seats contemplated are located in the choice \$3 section of the main floor to the rear of the boxes.

Since transportation is often a problem, arrangements are under advisement for an "auto corps." A favorable response to the above proposition will serve both you and the Civic Opera Company. In addition to the obvious assets of such an arrangement is the intangible one of diffusing friendly intercourse in the community.

H. S. Enrollment Is Rapidly Reaching High Peak of 1935

At present the total enrollment at Highland Park High school is 1,283 students, an increase of forty-eight students over the number registered there about a year ago. The freshman class which entered this fall consists of 340 boys and girls, ten fewer members than the freshman class of September, 1939. More than offsetting this smaller number, are forty upper classmen who transferred from other high schools. The present freshman group includes twenty-nine students new to this district since last June.

Highland Park High school is rapidly approaching its peak enrollment of 1,467 students in the year of 1934-1935, just before the Lake Forest High school was completed and opened in the northern part of the Deerfield-Shields Township High School district in September, 1935.

Study Proposed Merger of Coke And Gas Companies

The Preferred Stockholders Protective committee of the North Shore Gas company has been very busy the past few weeks, studying and analyzing the proposed plan for a merger of the Coke and Chemical company with the North Shore Gas company.

Mr. John D. Farnham, attorney for the Protective committee, reports daily conferences with the attorney of the Baehr interests, for the purpose of protecting the interests of the North Shore Gas Co. preferred stockholders. In this respect, it is the intention and purpose of the Protective committee to see that the Gas company's preferred stockholders receive their fair and equitable proportion of stock in the new proposed merged company.

Negotiations have now reached

the point where the merger plan will be discussed in the very near future with the Illinois Conference commission and the Federal Securities and Exchange Commission at Washington.

Another of the objectives of the Protective committee is to obtain substantial representation on the board of directors of any newly formed company, for the preferred stockholders of the North Shore Gas company. Such representation on the board of directors would be the first time in the history of the company, that this group of security holders has been represented in the management of the company. This class of security holders is mostly made up of small investors, living on the north shore.

The Protective committee now represents more than 60 percent of all the preferred stock outstanding of the North Shore Gas company. It is expected that as negotiations progress, a much larger proportion of the company's stockholders will request the Protective committee to represent them.

From time to time as new developments take place, the Protective committee will inform the stockholders of progress being made, through the columns of this newspaper.
