Elect Nominating Committee of C. of C. Tuesday Evening

The October meeting of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday evening at Open House. Sixty-six members were present and heard James R. Hawkinson, Professor of Marketing and Business Letters at Northwestern university, speak on "The Consumer Wants to Know."

Beginning with the early 17th century, Mr. Hawkinson traced the movement justifying the rights of the consumer up to the present day. He explained how legislation had met the issue and had forced the standardization of brands through labeling. The Better Business Bureau was established in 1913 to augment the work, said Mr. Hawkinson.

Women's groups have played an important part in improving conditions, and manufacturers have found it necessary to withhold all untrue statements. Business men are not opposed to the consumer's rights.

The following nominating committee was elected to select officers for the ensuing years. Those elected were Henry Siljestrom, Ed Menke, Earl W. Gsell, Robert Denzel, Les Stranger, Carl Hanson and Fred Giesler.

Two new members, the Highland Park Ten Pin and Gustav A. Baum were accepted into the organization.

Funeral service for Mrs. Ida G. Kerber, mother of Herbert E. Kerber, 903 S. Linden avenue, who died Friday at her home 911 Sherman avenue, Evanston, were held Monday at the First Presbyterian church of Evanston.

The deceased was the widow of the late Dr. Henry C. Kerber. She was born in Chicago Nov. 6, 1860. One of her earliest memories was that of Lincoln's funeral and she often told of standing at the bier of the assassinated president.

YMC To Feature Football Program At Meeting Oct. 17

Featuring an all star football program, the Highland Park Young Men's club will hold its monthly meeting next Thursday, October 17, at the Community Center at 8 o'clock. The principal speaker of the evening will be Burt "Worry" Ingwerson, head line coach at Northwestern university. Another highlight of the program will be the showing of the new 1940 film issued by the National Professional Football League.

Ingwerson, former coach at the University of Iowa, and also at Louisiana State university during the reign of the late Huey Long, is beginning his sixth year as head line coach at Northwestern. The excellent job he has done is reflected in that school's outstanding record for the past five seasons against the toughest opposition in the country. Burt, who was a four letter man in his college days at the University of Illinois, has a wide background of experience to talk from and is recognized as one of football's best speakers. He plans to bring other members of the Northwestern coaching staff with him to this meeting.

The thirty minute film which is to be shown begins with the 1939 all star game at Soldiers' Field and then visits the training camps of all the teams in the National Professional Football League. Following these shots are highlight scenes from some of the big games of last year's professional season. The picture closes with the championship game between the Green Bay Packers and the New York Giants at Milwaukee last December.

Also present at the meeting as guests of the Young Men's Club will be the members of the Highland Park High school football teams and their coaching staffs. As is the custom at each of these meetings, community singing will be led by Bill Larson with Harry Eaton at the piano. Dr. Baker M. Hamilton, president of the club, will preside over a ten minute business session, and refreshments will be served at the close of the program by Carl Lanzl and his committee.

Harry Skidmore, social chairman in charge of the meeting, wishes to announce that the doors of the community center will be open at 7:30 for a general get-together and that the meeting will begin promptly at 8 o'clock.

The membership of the Young Men's club has now reached a total of 138, and any young man from Highland Park who would like to join the club or secure more information about it is invited to attend the October meeting.
