The Deerfield-Northbrook Rotary club is meeting at Phil Johnson's restaurant on Waukegan road at County Line Rd. Last week William Aitken of Bannockburn was the guest speaker and told of his trip from Scotland on the ill-fated Athenia, of his transfer to the private yacht, White Swan, and of the completion of the voyage on the City of Flint. This week's speaker is Clifton Speer of Highland Park, executive of the North Shore Area of Boy Scouts. He will show movies of the boy scout camp. Deerfield Board Votes 3 Taverns; Change Ordinance

Edward B. Crush, trustee, changed the 4 to 2 vote which the village board has maintained in Deerfield since spring, when he left his partners, Trustees Homer Cazel, Jirah Cole and John D. Schneider, and joined the ranks with Marshall Pottenger and Edwin Palmer, to make a tie vote, 3 to 3, on Tuesday evening at the regular monthly meeting of the Deerfield Village Board. The vote concerned the ordinance which by the action of the board on Tuesday evening, increased the number of taverns from two to three, thus legally sanctioning the three taverns which have been operating for six years. The tie vote was broken by Mayor C. M. Willman, who voted in favor of the three taverns. Trustees Crush and Schneider both had been strong champions in eliminating one tavern and Mr. Schneider was much dismayed by Mr. Crush's sudden bolt. Mr. Crush admitted that when the mayor refused to eliminate the tavern which has caused so much trouble for the police committee, and that one of the well regulated taverns was to be closed instead, he therefore made a motion that the ordinance be changed to allow three taverns, instead of two. Jirah Cole called Mayor Willman a "czar" and names and remarks passed over the table during the discussion. "I place the failure on the shoulders of the mayor," said Mr. Cole.

Village Attorney Milton O. Olson was instructed to draw up the new ordinance. Thus ended one of the bitterest quarrels of the new board.

Trustee Cole reported the water loss for September was 2.1 per cent and that outstanding water bills over a period of seven years amounted to \$846.36. The water deposit of \$10 required from all renters and new accounts will be reduced after a period of two years when they have established good credit, the minimum reduction being to \$3 and not lower than twice the amount of their average monthly bill.

Judiciary Chairman Pottenger asked Village Clerk Chester Wesley to read the recommendations of A. L. Roderick, village auditor, which reminded the board that delinquent bills for thawing water mains in 1936 were still uncollected; that Bannockburn still owed for fire department calls; that there was a bill for the extension of water mains; that there were many delinquent water bills; that vehicle and dog licenses were much in arrears this year over last year; and that the liquor licenses for taverns had not as yet been settled.

Trustee Cazel, public works chairman, reported that the business district lighting cost was increased from \$18.86 to \$44 by the additional lighting during the summer.

The board voted to reduce the number of lighted lamps in order to cut down the bill. Resolutions were passed to spend \$150 for improving North avenue and \$290 for the stop and go lights, both to come from the motor fuel tax.

Police Chairman Crush presented the report of Justice of the Peace Woodman Todd covering a period from April 1, 1940, to Oct. 5, 1940. It will be read at the next meeting. The police report showed six arrests in September with fines of \$38. Mr. Crush stated that in the last 60 days juvenile delinquency has risen considerably with petty thefts, breakage, and malicious damage, done by a gang of six boys ranging in age from 12 to 16 years. These boys are away from home all night in their prowling and destructiveness. It was suggested that they be induced to join the Boy Scouts rather than have to be sent away to reformatories.

Repairs on Hemlock street in the Clavey subdivision will cost the village about \$200 so that a prospective home owner will be able to obtain a FHA loan to build his house. Another lot owner at Westgate and Warrington roads wanted sewer, water and street brought up to his property so that he could build. The board stated that he would have to stand the expenses.

The closing discussion was about the Sylvan Rifle Club which has its range on County Line road in the village. A. K. Platt was spokesman for the group and asked permission to use higher speed bullets. He submitted a sketch of their proposed safety range apparatus and the village board approved the plan.

The meeting was a lengthy one and the hall was well filled with both men and women, interested in the outcome of the liquor question, which took up most of the evening.

Registration Days in West Deerfield Twp.

Voters in West Deerfield Township, which includes the villages of Deerfield and Bannockburn, parts of the cities of Lake Forest and Highland Park are urged to register if they wish to vote in the presidential election on November 5. There will be two registration days, Tuesday, October 15, and Tuesday, October 29. The polls will be open on October 15 at 9 a.m. and will be closed when the judges have completed their work which may be any time in the afternoon. The polls will be open on October 29 from 9 a.m. and close at 4 p.m. Those voter not registering will be required to fill out an affidavit in order to vote.

Any voter who is going to be absent from Deerfield on the day of election may vote by absentee ballot. Application for the absentee ballot may be made to the Lake County clerk at the Court house, either by mail or in person, or may be obtained from any of the three precinct Republican committeemen, Clarence Pedersen, precinct one; David Petersen, precinct two; or Arthur Baker, precinct three.

October 31 is the last day to obtain the application by mail, but a voter may appear in person at the County Court house until the noon of November 2 to obtain his absentee ballot. Should an absentee voter fail to give the correct number of his precinct, his vote is not counted.

Precinct 3 (North) at Everett school, West Lake Forest.
