AN ORDINANCE AMENDING "THE HIGHLAND PARK ZONING ORDINANCE" PASSED JANUARY 27, 1930, AS AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION I. That an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED 'An Ordinance to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings; to regulate and limit the intensity of the use of lot areas, and to regulate and determine the amount of open space within and surrounding such buildings; to classify, regulate, and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for industrial, business, residential, and other uses; to divide the entire City of Highland Park into districts for the purpose of this ordinance; to fix standards to which buildings or structures shall conform to prohibit uses, buildings or structures incompatible with the character of such districts respectively; and to prevent additions to and alterations or remodeling of existing buildings or structures in such a way as to avoid the restrictions and limitations lawfully imposed hereunder, and to provide penalties for violation hereof," as amended, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:
That Section 2, "B" District of Article III entitled "District Regulations" be amended by eliminating therefrom the following provision except that portion of the ordinance placing said described property within the "A" District:
Lots 4 and 5 in Block 2, Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
Lots 14 to 22 inclusive in Block 5, Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
Lots 5 and 6, Block 3, Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
Lots 1 and 2, Backwell's Resubdivision.
Lots 1 and 2 in the Resubdivision of Block 2 Idlehour.
All of the lots in Resubdivision of Lots 7, 8, 9, 10 of Block 3 of Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
All of the lots included in the First Addition to Ravinia Highlands and except those lots included in John H. Sasser's Resubdivision.
All of the lots in John H. Sasser's Resubdivision.
All of the lots in Green's Subdivision of Lot 6 in Block 2 in Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in the Resubdivision of Murray and Terry's Resubdivision of Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 12 and 13 in Block 5 in Ridgewood Park Subdivision.
That Section 3 of Article V-a be amended to read as follows:
SECTION 3. REAR YARD AND GARAGE OR PARKING SPACE. On the lot with each main building there shall be provided rear yard space and garage or parking space as follows:
(a) A rear yard with a least dimension of not less than seventeen (17) feet; and
(b) One garage space or motor vehicle parking space at least nine (9) feet wide by twenty (20) feet long, for each two families housed on the lot, which may be located in the main building but shall not occupy side yards or project beyond the building setback line required by the provisions of this ordinance; provided, however, that the Board of Appeals and construction of garage buildings and driveways in apartment and group-house developments occupying more than one lot shall have the power to vary the above requirements as to garage or parking spaces on undivided lots, so long as the aggregate minimum requirements for all of the lots in the entire development shall comply with this section.
That Section 4 of Article V-a be amended to read as follows:
SECTION 4. SIDE YARD. There shall be a side yard on each side of the building having width of not less than six (6) feet and the sum of the width of the two side yards shall be not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) of the average width of the lot, provided, however, that in the case of an apartment house erected on a lot adjoining another lot in a "C" District, in accordance with the provisions of Section 8 of this Article, the sum of the width of the two side yards may be reduced to 15% of the average width of the lot, at least 10% of such average width being on the side which does not adjoin the "C" District lot.
Also that Section 8 of Article VI be amended to read as follows:
SECTION 8. REAR YARD AND GARAGE OR PARKING SPACE. On the lot with each apartment house there shall be provided rear yard space, garage or parking space as follows:
(a) A rear yard with a least dimension of not less than seventeen (17) feet; and
(b) One garage space or motor vehicle parking space at least nine (9) feet wide by twenty (20) feet long for each two families housed on the lot which may be located in the main building but shall not occupy side yards or project beyond the building setback line required by the provisions of this ordinance; provided, however, that to permit convenient and economical grouping and construction of garage buildings and driveways the Board of Appeals shall have the power to vary the above requirements as to garage or parking spaces on undivided lots so long as the aggregate minimum requirements for all of the lots in the entire development shall comply with this section.
SECTION II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
SECTION III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recordation and due publication.

Ruth Page Will Feature Opening Of Woman's Club

(Continued from Page 1) she said, they do not hesitate to show their feelings but are quick both to shout applause and to hiss their disapproval. Critics and audiences in Havana and elsewhere were stirred by her dance "Tropic." But her dance "Delirious Delusion," a comic surrealist dance which is successful in even the smallest towns in the United States, was hissed. Concerning this, Miss Page said, "It is, of course, always dangerous to do comic dances in any country, as each nationality laughs at different things."
While Ruth Page has been often referred to as a worthy successor to the marvelous Pavlova, Miss Page's creative ability and scope of interpretation have the original quality so satisfying to audiences

with tastes advanced in this changing, trying-to-improve world. It is not disparaging to the art of Anna Pavlova to say that her repertoire adhered almost strictly to the usual classical ballets which allowed no room for other original interpretations.
Miss Page points out that business or trade, politics and armaments are not the only instrumentalities of a closer relationship between the United States and South American countries. There has been a sharpened interest by North American touring ballet companies in Central and South America. Our other arts have also sent, or are considering sending, exhibits and shows.
On that score Miss Page says, "Many of our leading dance organizations are going there these days. Most of South America is in about the same state that the United States was in twenty-five years ago. Its peoples look almost entirely to Europe for their culture, and they have not sought much at home for material for their art. Now there is almost sure to be a continual and increasing interchange of art and artists between North and South America."

One amusing remark made by Miss Page further concerning Venezuela also illuminates the sharp contrasts to be found there, "We presented our ballets in the beautiful Teatro Municipal of Caracas. The fact that the fleas liked it, too, and that the plumbing was very primitive actually did not bother me much, for, to me, it is one of the loveliest theaters in the world."

Wayland Brooks, candidate for U. S.
