Local Rifle Club Holds First Match On New Range Oct. 13

The Sheridan Rifle and Pistol club have issued announcements of a rifle match to be held on their new range on Sunday, October 13. The range, located on Lake-Cook road and one-half mile west of Waukegan road in Deerfield, is still under construction but is far enough advanced to provide eighty firing points for the competitors. Firing will begin promptly at 9 a.m. and will continue until 4 p.m.

The program, as issued by the executive officer, Dr. J. A. Butterworth, will consist of six matches of forty shots at each range, 50 yards, 100 yards, and Dewar Course, fired with metallic sights and any sights. A silver trophy will be awarded to the winner of the Grand Aggregate and medals will be awarded to the three high competitors in the other matches.

Range personnel will consist of entirely club members. The actual firing will be under the supervision of Mr. J. McCraren, chief range officer.

The Sheridan club cordially invites the public to attend the match, either as a shooter or a spectator.

Local Radio Amateur Contacts Snow Cruiser At the South Pole

Mr. James V. Kidwell, who resides at 117 S. Central street, Highwood, and conducts an amateur Radio Station W9TRZ, Highwood, successfully contacted the Snow Cruiser (the Byrd Expedition) at the South Pole, via Amateur Radio Phone at 6:10 p.m. Sunday, October 6.

A one hundred per cent contact was made. Temperature there at the time was reported at 6 degrees above zero, while the lowest temperature recorded by them was 76 below.

The Snow Cruiser is now located about 200 miles from the South Pole, and they are having 24 hours of daylight.

A verification of this contact will be sent when mail goes out in January, but it will not reach here before April or May.

Mr. Kidwell, who is a radio enthusiast, has contacted stations in all parts of the world.
