

This is an election year. Very soon many first voters and many second and third voters will go to the polls to cast a vote. Before that time you may have occasion to discuss some political issue or our system of voting.

The Highland Park Public library has available, books which answer supplement your present knowledge the humidity averages 28 degrees or books which will supply you with information about American government, its history, growth and present set-up. "American Party System," by Charles E. Merriam and Harold F. Gosnell. The book shows such chapters as: the evolution of major party issues; formulation of party issues; party leaders; the organization of the party; state nominating systems; presidential nominations; functions of parties and the future of parties. A completely revised 1940 book.

"American Government and Politics," by Charles A. Beard. The role of government in modern civilization is his theme under the discussion of the national government, and it includes this statement: "From decade to decade the functions of government increase in number and developments and functions of each division of the national government. The second half of the book deals with state and local government; the state and its constitution; popular control in state and local governments; state departments; and municipal functions. 
