* With the coming of the Fall and Winter months, when dusk comes earlier, there should also be an increase in the amount of caution used in driving automobiles. Particularly at night. National figures show that nearly 60 percent of all highway fatalities occur at night, when about one-third of the driving is done. This means, then, that the motor vehicle death rate is three times as high at night as during the day.

★ Traffic accidents are also likely to be more serious at night than in the daytime, when only one in every forty-nine motor vehicle injuries are fatal. A number of causes contribute to this dangerous situation. A drinking driver puts in his appearance mostly at night. Motorists after a hard day's work or a long day behind the wheel will find themselves fatigued and do not have the alertness necessary for safe driving. And last, but far from the least, improperly focused headlights or "one-eyed" cars contribute to a large number of accidents.

* Remember the following rules when driving at night. Don't drive if you have been drinking. Don't drive if you are tired. Have your headlights, brakes, tires and horn checked regularly. Dim your lights when approaching oncoming traffic and replace that burnedout bulb immediately. Let's all become SAFETY MINDED!
