Amateur Craftsmen's Guild Here is a new idea for you amateur craftsmen, especially those

whose hobby is woodworking, who love to work in craft shops and make things—namely to organize in Highland Park a Craftsmen's guild.

It is the hope of the committee back of this idea to band together many of the Craft Shop hobbyists who now have shops in their homes to give them the opportunity to exchange ideas and to solve those knotty problems which frequently come up. The guild is also meant for those who do not have their own work shops but who wish to learn more about crafts.

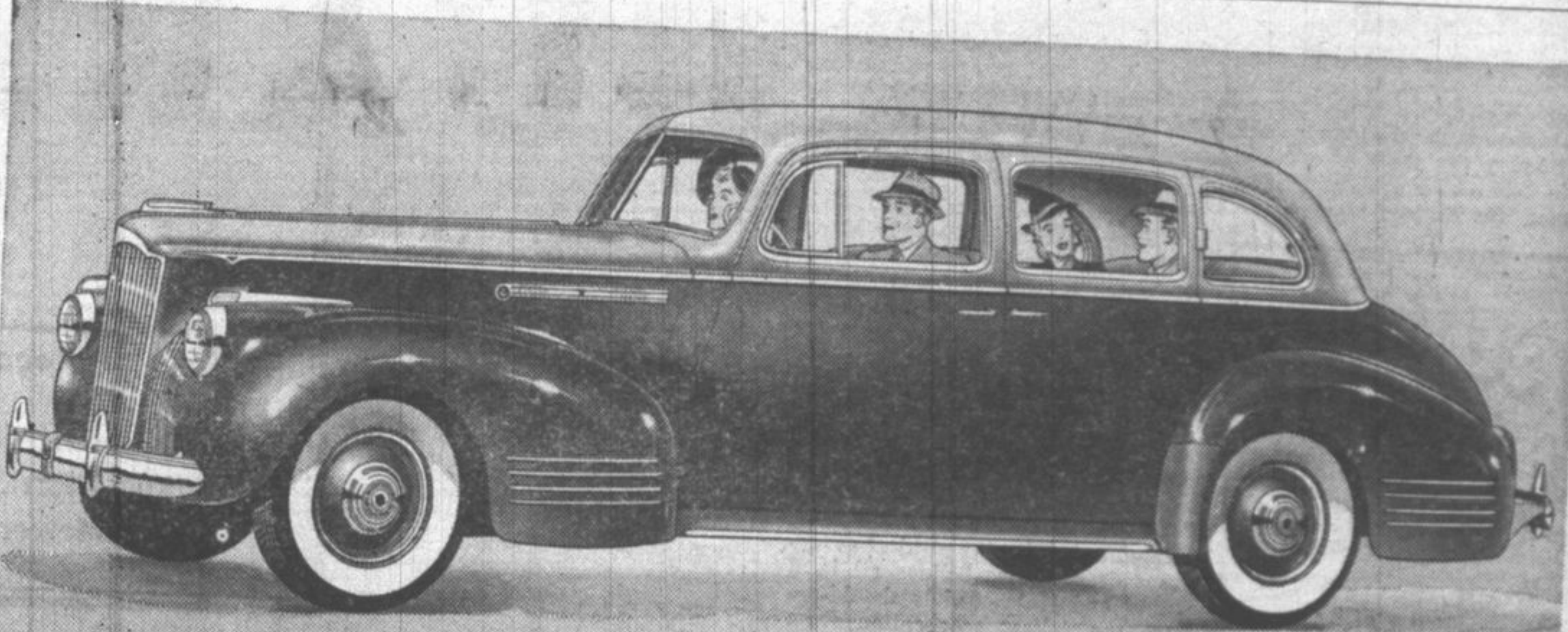
At the meetings of the guild experts shall be called in many of the craft fields to discuss the best methods of craft construction. At first the talks would pertain to general shop procedure and cover each special type of machine usually found in craft shops, such as jig saw uses; how to sharpen tools; using carving chisels; wood turning on a lathe, etc.

Guild members will, in addition to the regular meetings, have the opportunity to use the tools and equipment in the newly developed Rotary Craft shop for projects they wish to complete. Instruction in the use of these tools will be available for those who wish it.

Membership in the guild will have many other possible features, such as:

- 1. To sponsor junior craft classes with volunteer as well as paid instructors in wood work, metal work, leather work, etc.
2. It could have a ladies' section who could specialize in jewelry, metal work, leather work, etc.
3. Members of the guild could assume as a civic project the repair of many Christmas toys which soon will pour into the Community Center. These toys are distributed by the Social Service to many needy children at Christmas time.
