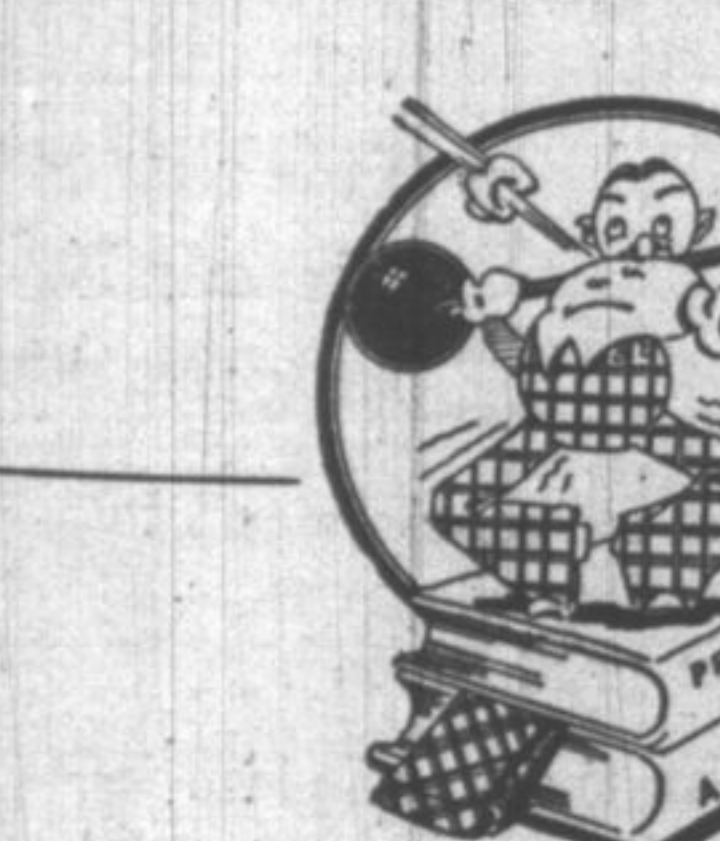
After inspecting the proposal from the Public Service company for a new system in their city lighting plans, the Highwood city council Friday night approved its acceptance.

The new system calls for using the same lighting equipment, but instead of burning the lights until 2 a.m., they will burn from dusk to dawn. Because of a rate reduction, operation of this new system will cut the cost approximately \$200 a year.
