

National Election at Winnetka Meeting

Independent Voters will voice their opinion on the paramount issues of the national election in a mass meeting on Friday evening in Winnetka Stokio school auditorium.

Under the chairmanship of Adria Stevenson prominent Chicago attorney and one of the North Shore's leading citizens, four of the outstanding personalities in the life of the Chicago-Metropolitan area will present their position on why voters should support President Roosevelt for re-election.

Charlotte Carr, head resident of Hull House, will speak on the gains in social welfare made under the Roosevelt administration and why their extension makes his re-election imperative. The business man's viewpoint will be expressed by Charles P. Megan, past president of the Chicago and Illinois-Bar associations, who will take as his subject, "The Businessman's Stake in Progressive Government."

"Foreign Policy" will be dealt with by Professor A. R. Hatton, former head of Northwestern University's Department of Political Science. Professor Jerome Kerwin of the University of Chicago will speak on "Roosevelt—Symbol of Progress."

The meeting is under the auspices of the "National Committee of Independent Voters for Roosevelt and Wallace" headed by United States Senator George W. Norris and Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia. State chairmen of the committee are Charlotte Carr and Dean William F. Porter of Winnetka is chairman of the North Shore organization.

Bethany Choir in Sacred Musical

Repairing a swollen window sash caused by damp weather is best done after the windows dry out. Once the window will open, rub a little candle liberally in the grooves or apply floor wax throughout their length. When you want to open a window that is swollen without waiting for it to dry out, it may help to fill a medicine dropper with linseed oil that has been thinned with an equal amount of turpentine and drop some of this mixture into the crack at each side of the top of the frame. If the window sticks in dry weather as well as wet, it probably will have to be planed down before any permanent "cure" is effected.

If it is necessary to paint plaster that has not become thoroughly dry, a coat of zinc sulphate and water will cut down adverse effects of alkali in the plaster on paint. Use one-and-a-half to two pounds of zinc sulphate to a gallon of water, brush on the wall surface and give it time to dry before painting.

Use cold water to remove egg stains, following with hot water and soap if the material is washable, or a grease solvent if it is not. In the latter case, allow the stained place to dry after being sponged with cold water before applying the solvent.
