AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 16 OF CHAPTER XIX OF HIGHLAND PARK CODE OF 1919, ENTITLED: "DOGS," WHICH SECTION IS ALSO KNOWN AS SECTION 969 OF HIGHLAND PARK CODE OF 1919, ENTITLED: "GENERAL PENALTIES," BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1. That Section 16 of Chapter XIX of the Highland Park Code of 1919, which section is also known as Section 969 of the Highland Park Code of 1919, entitled "General Penalties," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

969. GENERAL PENALTY. Sec. 16. Any person or persons who shall violate, fail, neglect or refuse to comply with, any of the foregoing provisions of this chapter, when no other penalty is prescribed, shall, on conviction, be fined a sum not less than two dollars, nor more than ten dollars for each and every offense.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recording.
