the way bark was used for building.

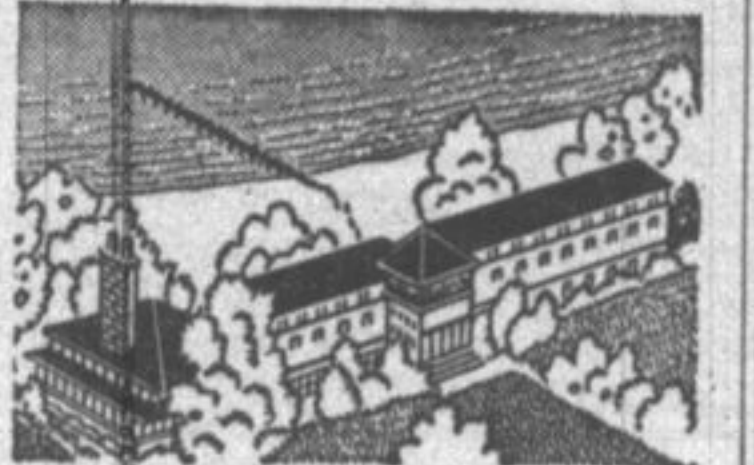
