cries need is for more funds. He pointed out that much of the equipment still in daily use in 13 years old and practically beyond repair. Commissioner Bowes gave a short resume on the various branches of his department which include supervision of public buildings, insurance, franchises, zoning, and operation of the building and fire departments. Through a more judicious method of buying insurance, increased coverage at a saving of some \$400 was made possible. City employees who handle large sums of money have also been bonded.

Two of the many problems facing Commissioner Bowes' department in recent months were the taxi-cab stand puzzle and the question whether to allow the street lights to remain on all night. The former problem has been practically solved by providing two spots for the cabs to park. The latter is still in the process of discussion. A vote taken at the Town Hall meeting revealed the audience to be about evenly divided.

The introduction of City Marshall Andrews and his subsequent outline of the recent improvements made in his department wound up the main part of the meeting. Also called upon for bows of acknowledgement were Fire Marshal Hoskins, City Clerk Musser and Corporation Counsel McKenna.

From the success of this Town Hall meeting it is apparent that the league plans to make this affair an annual one. That it is of distinct value to both the council and the community is beyond argument. The league and those in attendance at Monday evening's session are of the opinion that this value can be still further enhanced by a larger participation on the part of the audience, in the open forum after the speakers have had their say. As more meetings are held, of course, this bashfulness of the audience will undoubtedly tend to disappear.
