## To Exhibit Herd of Shorthorn Cattle At 1940 Exposition

J. D. Allen, prominent Lake county farm operator, of Chicago, will exhibit a herd of purebred Short-horn cattle at the 1940 International Live Stock Exposition, to be held at the Chicago Stock Yards November 30 to December 7. The Allen farm is near Libertyville.

This country's largest annual agricultural show will be staged in the International Amphitheatre, the forthcoming event marking the 41st annual revival of the exposition.

Although entries do not close for the livestock classes until November 1st, the early listings are so heavy that the management predicts a total showing exceeding 13,000 animals. Cash prizes amounting to approximately \$100,000 will be offered at the show in competitions that will feature 27 different breeds of beef cattle, draft horses, sheep and swine.

Farm youth plays a prominent part in the programs of the exposition, with the National 4-H Club Congress held annually in conjunction with it. A huge delegation of farm youth state champions in 4-H club work from 44 states and Canada will attend the 1940 congress to compete for national honors of the year.

The world's largest farm crop contest, the International Grain and Hay show, is also held each year in connection with the livestock show. Farmers from 34 states, all provinces of Canada, and Australia took part in this event last year. Entries of crop samples may be made without cost to the exhibitor, it is announced, and will be accepted until November 10.
