Because the bid of the Darrow and Barron Company of \$12,309.04 was \$309.90 more than the Chicago firm's bid, he said, the state highway department rejected the contract.

Now Highwood aldermen must revoke all proceedings relative to the contract and award it to the Chicago company, or reject all bids and ask for new ones.

\$3,600 Still Needed To Finance Work Of Chest Agencies

Still \$3,600 short of the \$50,000 needed to finance the work of the thirteen member agencies of the Community Chest during the next twelve months following Tuesday night's report meeting of the district chairmen of the Chest Campaign, Chest officials started working yesterday on plans for an intensive drive on all residents of the community who have not yet done their part in assisting the Chest to secure the full fund needed.

"We must raise our full quota of \$50,000," said President Joseph B. Garnett of the Chest today, "or some of our Chest agencies are going to have to curtail their normal activities. Highland Park has never yet failed to go "Over the Top" in a Chest campaign and I feel certain that all citizens who have

not yet responded with a subscription will come forward promptly within the next few days to help in meeting this year's goal."

Two districts passed the 100% mark in raising their quota at Tuesday night's report meeting. District 8 in charge of Messrs. Carl Herbst and Harold Pfister has turned in \$1,311.50 towards its quota of \$1,300; and District 13 headed by Daniel Davitt and Mrs. Jess Halsted has secured \$1,222.50 against a quota of \$1,200. Districts 15 and 16 are in striking distance of their quotas and should "go over the top" before the week-end.

General Campaign Chairman Don Nichols sent out an S.O.S. to all district leaders today to call upon their workers to turn back all prospect cards to Chest Headquarters by Friday evening of this week with a full report on each.

"If we have not reached the goal by this week-end," said Mr. Nichols, "we plan to put into the field next week a number of specially picked teams of workers who will endeavor to finish our job before Thanksgiving."

"We feel," said Mr. Nichols, "that many people who might help with a subscription of a dollar to five dollars have been reluctant to give a small amount. We want these people to know that we need at this point in the campaign the help of every person who can give some amount, no matter how small. The aggregate of many small gifts at this time will, I am certain, enable us to meet the goal. So if you are one who has not given as yet because you have felt the amount you can give is too small to help, please do not hesitate longer.
