Local Boys Called As Flying Cadets

Two youths were called last week in the allotment of 150 young men from Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin to serve as flying cadets. The order was issued by Brig. Gen. Charles H. Bonstead, Sixth Corps area commander.

Lewis Martin Domke, 638 Chicago avenue, and Richard August Knobloch, Fort Sheridan, were included in the list of prospective army aviators who will begin service Nov. 27 at Tulsa, Okla.

Upon completion of their training at the civilian school, Domke and Knobloch will be given three-month basic, advanced and specialized courses at Randolph field, Tex.; Maxwell field, Ala.; or Moffet field, Calif. After that they can be transferred to Kelly field, Tex., for their final three-month training as cadets. Upon graduation, they will be commissioned second lieutenants in the Air Corps reserve.

Mrs. F. M. Lowe Found Shot To Death Saturday

Mrs. Vernet J. Lowe, 45, of 380 Hazel avenue, was found shot to death in her home early Saturday morning. She was found lying at the foot of her bed with a .32 caliber Savage automatic pistol beside her.

At an inquest held Monday afternoon, a coroner's jury returned a verdict of death due to a self-inflicted bullet wound while despondent over financial troubles and ill health.

The body was discovered by Mrs. Fred Biggs, 345 S. Linden avenue, a friend, who called at the home when she failed to respond to the telephone. When she did not answer

her door bell, Mrs. Biggs entered the home and called, but receiving no answer went upstairs, where she found Mrs. Lowe lying on her bed, dead.

The bullet had entered the upper portion of her left temple and emerged at the lower portion of the right side of her head.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Kelley Funeral chapel, 27 N. Sheridan road. Interment was private.

Surviving are her husband, F. MacDonald Lowe; a daughter, Barbara Ann, 10 years old, and two step-sons, MacDonald and Whitney.
