"Adam and Fallen Man" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, November 10.

The Golden Text was, "Unto thee will I cry, O Lord my rock. . . Save thy people, and bless thine inheritance: feed them also, and lift them up for ever" (Psalms 28:1, 9).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And it came to pass about an eight days after these sayings, he took Peter and John and James, and went up into a mountain to pray. And as he prayed, the fashion of his raiment was white and glistening. And behold, there talked with him two men, which were Moses and Elias: and there came a voice out of the cloud, saying, This is my beloved Son: hear him" (Luke 9:28-30, 35).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Through discernment of the spirit, the opposite of materiality, even the veil through Christ, Truth, man will reopen with the key of divine Science the gates of Paradise which human beliefs have closed, and will find himself unfallen, upright, pure, and free, not needing to consult almanacs for the probabilities either of his life or of the weather, not needing to study bromide maps to learn how much of man he is" (p. 177).

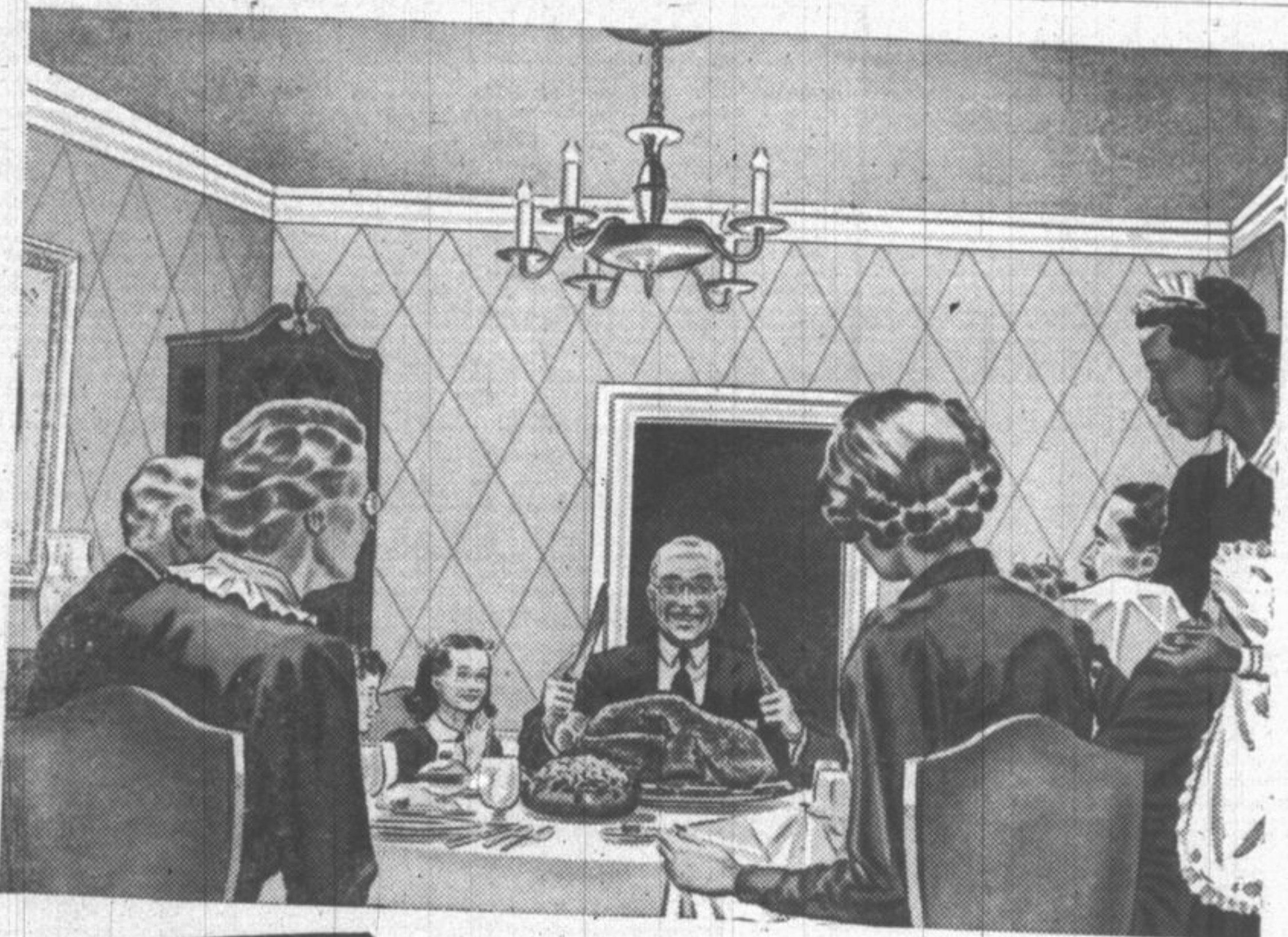
