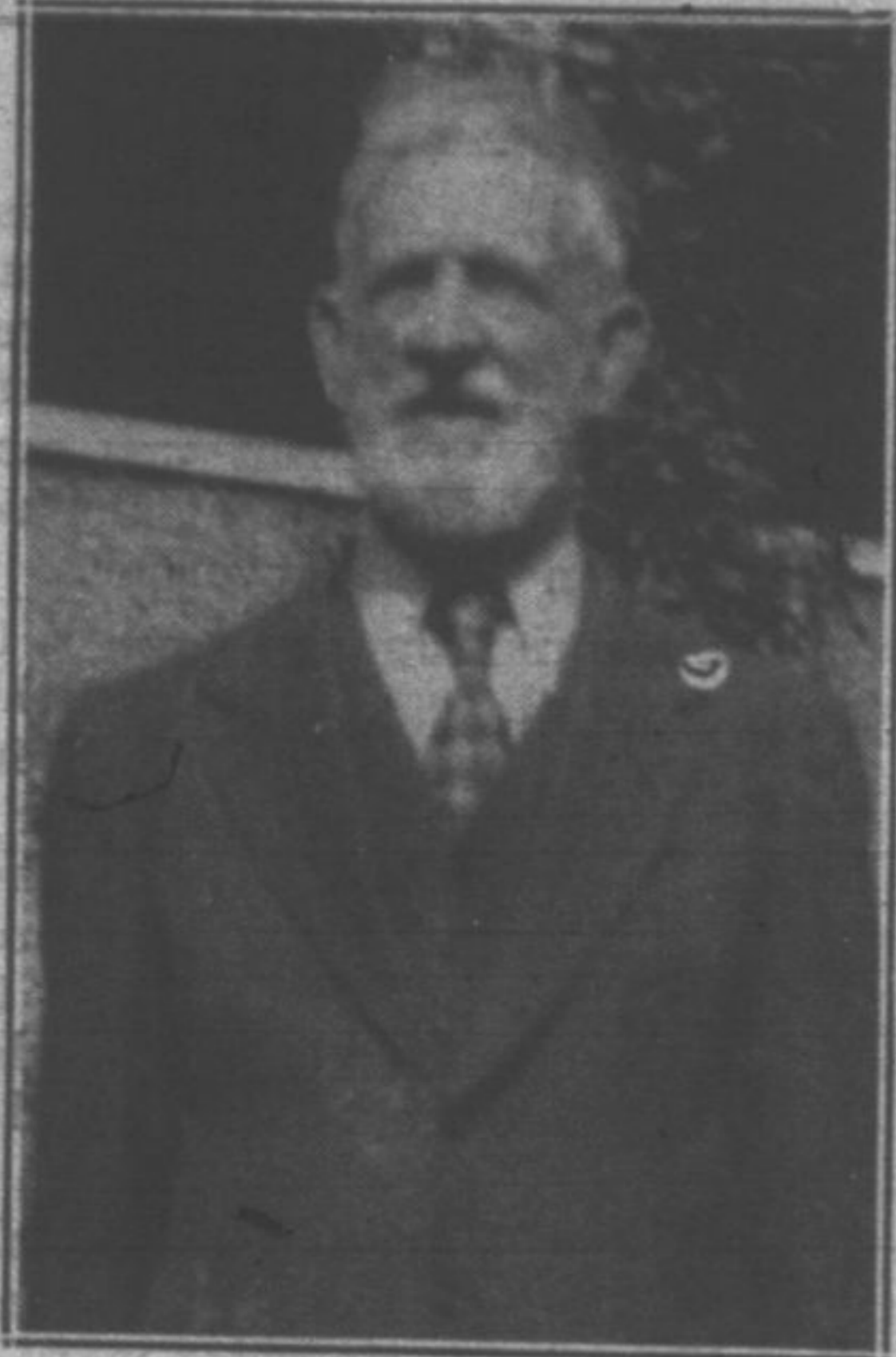


DANIEL COBB DIES, FORMER MAYOR HERE

Passes - Away Thursday at Home In Florida

With the passing of Daniel M. Cobb on Thursday of last week at his orange grove near Lake Wales, Florida, another of the pioneers of Highland Park is gone.

His was an unusually long and interesting life, the varied experiences of which, he had a remarkable way of recalling. Born 88 years ago, in 1852, on the cotton plantation near Vicksburg, Miss., owned by his father, a partner of Jefferson Davis, he went through many thrilling adventures as a boy during the Civil war, where the Yanks and Confeds were fighting it out along the lower Mississippi. His father in the closing years of the Civil war sent his family to Europe to spare them further hardships.

There, Mr. Cobb was educated in private schools in Munich, Paris and Rome. Then the Franco-Prussian war broke out and Mr. Cobb lived through the stirring scenes of an

Mrs. George Carr Dies Suddenly On Thanksgiving Day

Mrs. Helen Taylor Carr, 64, of 1271 Wade street, died suddenly Thanksgiving Day, while preparing the holiday dinner. She was the wife of George Wallace Carr, a Chicago architect.

Born in Hopewell Junction, N.Y., Mrs. Carr had lived on the North Shore since 1904. She was the daughter of the late Graham Taylor, who was founder of the Chicago Commons.

A member of the Highland Park League of Women Voters and the Ravinia Woman's Club, she was also founder of the Chicago Commons Auxiliary. She was very active in social and civic work, both in Highland Park and Ravinia.

Besides her husband, a daughter, Mrs. Janet Schroeder, and a son, Wallace Carr, survive. She also leaves a brother, Graham Taylor, Jr., of New York, and two sisters, Katherine Taylor of Shady Hill School in Cambridge, Mass., and Miss Leah Taylor of Chicago Commons.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the family residence with Dr. Arthur Holt of the Theological seminary officiating. Interment was at Graceland cemetery.

\$2,000 STILL NEEDED TO COMPLETE GOAL

Three of 16 Districts Report 100% of Quotas

Still \$2,000 short of the \$50,000 goal, Community Chest officials were making every effort to clean up all outstanding subscriptions by the end of the present week, before making some form of special appeal to the public to raise the balance of the Chest budget.

The full amount must be raised, according to Edwin C. Jones, executive secretary of the Chest, in order to meet the needs of the thirteen member agencies of the Chest without curtailing the services of some agencies.

"Splendid work has been done by the volunteer workers to date in an effort to reach the goal," said General Chairman Don Nichols today. "A total of 176 more subscribers have been obtained this year over last year. We feel certain that our final efforts will prove successful. We need the support of every Highland Park citizen who has not yet done his or her full part in this year's campaign, and we hope that many will voluntarily come forward now to make the task easier and our success sure."

Three of the sixteen district committees have now made over 100% of their quotas. They are as follows: Eight, thirteen and sixteen.

District sixteen, the business district of the city, was particularly commended by Chest officials for the fine showing it has made to date, turning in a total of \$3,212.25 against a quota of \$3,200, or 100.3%.
