

CIVIC ASSOCIATION PLANS XMAS CONTEST

Deerfield Group To Decorate Business District

The Deerfield Civic Association met on Tuesday evening in the Town Hall with E. F. Nelson, the president, in the chair. A report of the school consolidation committee was given by Mrs. Lester B. Ball, a member of that committee, which showed progress in their efforts to unite the Wilmot and Deerfield Grammar school districts. The committee is to have a meeting in the next week or so, with both boards of education to further discuss the question.

The Civic Association will again sponsor the Christmas lighting contest for homes and the stores. The committee appointed includes J. A. Benz, chairman, Edward H. Selig,

Kenneth J. Weir, and Arthur G. Pearson. The business district will be decorated and the strings of lights purchased last year will again be used at the main intersection of Deerfield and Waukegan roads.

Burton B. McRoy, chairman of the skating rink committee, reported that the field house has been repaired and painted and that the rink will be made ready for ice skating as soon as the weather permits. Members of Mr. McRoy's committee are William Cruickshank, William Johnston and Lester B. Ball.

Negotiations are underway to secure a speaker for either the January or February meeting who will tell of the advantages of a Village Manager. The next regular meeting of the association is the fourth Tuesday evening in January, but special committee meetings on the school consolidation and Christmas lighting contest are to be held and reports of their progress will be made.
