

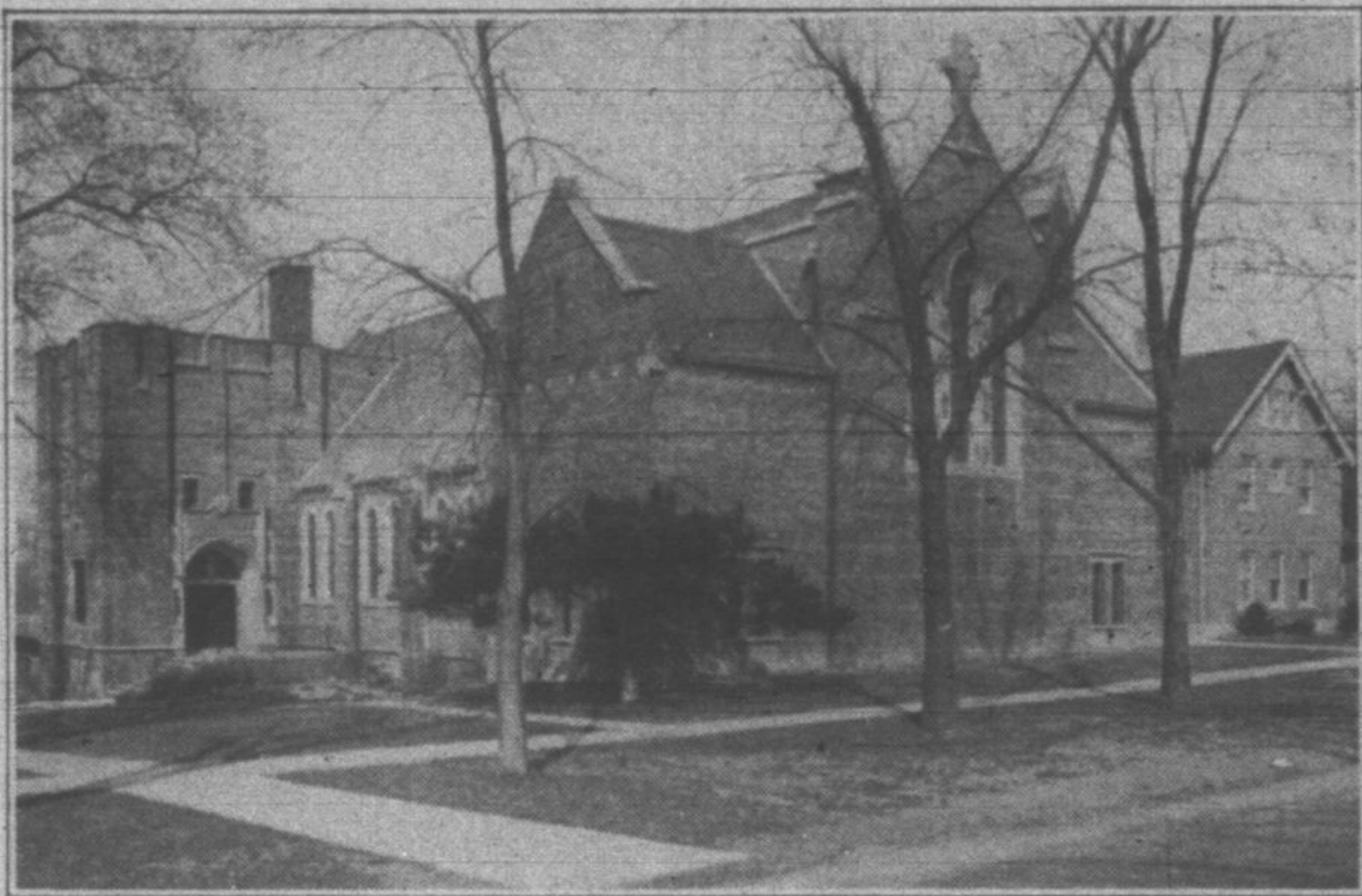
Breaking Ground for Bethany Church In 1925



The above picture will be of interest to members and friends of Bethany church. This ground breaking service took place on Thanksgiving Day in 1925. Excavation for the new church began the following day. The Sunday school unit was completed first. In the fall of 1928 the building of the remainder of the edifice began and the church was dedicated April 14, 1929, at an approximate cost of \$125,000. The unusual feature is that during the depression days, when a great proportion of the church members were unemployed, the entire debt was paid off.

The names of those appearing in this picture was not obtainable, but many of you will be able to identify those pictured at this service.
