Mrs. Friedel S. Fuller's knitters have already finished one-half dozen sleeveless sweaters, several pairs of mittens, eight pairs of socks, and many more articles are close to completion.

Peter Bellert, who at various times had held almost every public office in Northbrook, died Tuesday in his home at 1888 Shermer avenue, Northbrook. He was born Jan. 14, 1857, in Niles Center, and had spent more than 50 years as a resident of Northbrook. He was a retired harness maker. Mr. Bellert was Northbrook's second mayor and also had been a village trustee, school trustee, police magistrate, fire chief, and supervisor of Northbrook township. He leaves three daughters, Mrs. Mary Corson, Kathryn Bellert, and Sister Mary Joseph, C. S. J. The funeral was held at 9 a.m. Friday from the chapel at 1900 Shermer avenue, Northbrook, and St. Norbert's church, Techny, with burial in Sacred Heart cemetery.
